Under this system, the independents would be made to carry some of the burden of staing the price brought about

Figures on costs of distributing milk were laid before the two groups and distributors repeatedly asserted that their profits were not too high. It developed at the meeting that the retail distribution of milk in Portland was instficient in the fact that there was much overlapping of competing picture although it is not all com-edy. 




