She asks that his complaint be dismissed and that she be awarded care of the three children, for whom she asks support money. BUSY WEEKS AHEAD FOR CHEMEKETANS

Crooked Finger Trip Slated Sunday, Mt. Hood Climb Following Weekend

The Chemeketans, outdoor organization for the Salem Y. M. C. A., have a busy program arranged for the next six weeks according to the current issue of their monthly publication. First on the list of interesting hikes and trips will be the Crooked Finger Ridge junket next Sunday, led by Dr. Grover Bellinger. Cars will leave the "Y" here at 7 a.m. and the group will be taken to the Scotts Mills country where the hike will begin. The ridge to be traversed lies in Marion county between Butte creek and Abigun creek, running in fairly high rounded hills at the edge of the valley along the road between the Rocky Four corners and the Pine tree corners northwest of Silverton.

The annual Mt. Hood climb of the Chemeketans has been set for Saturday and Sunday, July 18 and 19. The group will leave here as early Saturday afternoon as possible with W. I. McCloud as leader. They will drive to Government camp, then hike to the timber line where camp will be made for the night. Early the next morning the hikers will start up the mountain, planning to reach the top by noon. The cost for the entire trip has been set at \$3.50 a member. Hikers to wear heavy-soled shoes, heavy wool socks with warm sweater and wind proof jacket. Colored glasses will be required on the trip and cold cream and grease paint will be furnished.

Pamella Lake Goal—Of Hike August 2. Chemeketans are to hike in to Pamella lake in the Mt. Jefferson country. The group will leave here early in the morning, driving up the North Santiam 15 miles beyond Detroit and here leaving the cars for a six-mile hike in to the lake.

MEIER PLEASED WITH OUTCOME

Definite Progress for tax Reduction Seen After Conference Here

Gratification at the results accomplished in the state-wide tax conservation meeting held in Salem Wednesday, was expressed by Governor Meier Thursday in a statement in which he also reiterated his willingness to call a special session of the legislature to provide machinery for tax relief.

"It is a fine demonstration of devotion to public welfare, the governor said, when 65 business men will leave their personal affairs and come, at their own expense from every corner of the state, to give time and thought to the vital and urgent problems of public finance and taxation.

Early Benefits Are Forecast—"Yesterday's meeting resulted in definite and tangible action that will insure early and practical results. Those who listened in at the deliberations can have no doubt that public opinion has been aroused and that a state-wide consciousness of existing conditions has been awakened. All that is needed now to secure relief from the oppressive tax burden is aggressive and constructive leadership.

The permanent organization which has been perfected and the calling of the officers and members of the executive committee insure that leadership. If, after they have had a chance to study all the angles of the situation, the officers and members of the executive committee feel, as I do, that the need for tax relief is immediate and that legislative enactments are required to provide the machinery for relief, I shall be disposed to call a special session of the legislature, with a view to getting prompt and constructive action."
