

PAUL FRANKLIN IS OREGON CHAMPION

Builds Best Model Coach in Fisher Contest; Gets Trip to Detroit

Honors are not unusual to Paul Franklin, winner of the senior state championship in the Fisher body contest for the best miniature Napoleon coach. Paul has won many prizes, including a large silver loving cup, for model airplanes which he has built. However he admits that the coach which he brought home was by far the most difficult problem he has ever attempted. As a reward for his efforts Paul will be sent to Detroit as a guest of the Fisher Body company and will receive an additional prize of \$50 in gold. With all this he will be entered in the national competition, the winner of which will receive a four year university scholarship.

Paul takes his honors modestly and when questioned as to how it felt to be famous his dark eyes twinkled as he answered, "I don't know that I am, yet. Those dark eyes were obviously on far horizons and Paul is ready to take advantage of any opportunity that may be offered to perfect his talent and to study. That he will meet new opportunities with the same painstaking effort that made his most recent victory possible was evident.

"What was the most difficult part of the work?" he was asked. "The painting," was the prompt reply. He went on to explain that a particular type of lacquer was used which was supposed to be put on by spray, lacking this equipment he used a brush and spent many weary hours in accomplishing the task.

His mother accidentally revealed a bit of his story when she said: "Paul is never satisfied with anything but his very best work. He had so much difficulty in putting the upholstery on his coach as it was such a tedious task. After the work was completed he found that he had used kind of material had been used. Nothing would do but he would take it all out and put in the new. "We tried to persuade him not to, but he said it would not be right."

It is this careful attention to detail which has made Paul's airplanes winners in almost every contest that he has entered. "I just always try to do my very best work," said Paul.

Encouraged in Crafts Interest

An outsider Paul who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Franklin, is fortunate in many ways, but most of all he is to be congratulated upon the parents he has. He was but a small boy when they discovered that he showed real talent for craft work. He was furnished with simple tools and encouraged to develop his skill. When he was 14 years old his father supplied the lumber and Paul built a work shop at home. The shop is still in use and is a credit to any carpenter. When the shop was completed he was given more tools and supplied with wood and other materials needed for his work.

"It is the cheapest way to raise a boy," said Mr. Franklin. "You see he has always had something to do at home that he was interested in and for that reason we never had to worry about where he was or what he was doing. We have been saved a lot of worry and anxiety. Paul has always attended strictly to business and has given us no trouble."

During the past year Paul attended Capital Business college. He is uncertain as to what he will do during the coming year but he hopes to go farther in craft work.

RHEA LUPER CASE FUTURE IN DOUBT

Issuance of a formal order by Judge G. F. Skipworth in the Rhea Luper case, set for today, has been postponed until next week because of the judge's inability to complete the June term of circuit court in Lane county in time to be here. Luper is under grand jury indictment for diversion of state funds when he was state engineer. Judge Skipworth has already given an opinion that the indictment of Luper is invalid due to the fact that the grand jury, appointed by Circuit Judge McMahon, had completed its legal term and thus was without authority to indict Luper.

Skipworth has asked the district attorney here and Oscar Hayter, attorney for Luper, to be in court next week. What action the judge will take is not known but it is surmised he will remand the case to a newly drawn grand jury for further investigation. Luper is free on bail. Meanwhile Circuit Judge McMahon has ignored the ruling of Judge Skipworth and told the old grand jury to continue its investigations.

CHAIN MERGER NOT IN EFFECT TO DATE

The effect of the merger on the MacMarr and the Skaggs-Sawyer stores on the local units of the two concerns was not known here yesterday by local managers for the organizations. The deal, announced this week, was effective as of July 1.


Training School On at Philomath
