## AUXILIARY'S WARDS TO BE IMMUNIZED

Following the proverbial "ounce of prevention" idea, the Capitol post American Legion auxiliary arranged with the county health department yesterday to have all children of the 27 indigent families under the auxiliary's care immunized for both diphtheria and smallpox and examined periodically for general health.

Members of the welfare and hospital committees, headed by Mrs. M. J. Molchoir, have decided that this is their best move in order to save the lives of the children under their care, and as well to conserve their funds by avoiding the expensive bills from illness. The move resulted from the death Sunday from diphtheria of the two year old son of one of the families which they have been assisting.

In order to enforce their new stand, the auxiliary will require that children of these families be given the toxoid and vaccination treatments, if they are to continue to receive the aid of the organization.
