Noe Meads Work in Eastern Oregon

District No. 2 will comprise virtually all of eastern Oregon, with headquarters at Baker. H. Lee Noe has been appointed captain of this district. Other officers who will operate in this district and their stations include: Earl B. Houston, sergeant, Baker; J. A. Robertson, sergeant, LaGrande; S. C. Linville, sergeant, Pendleton; and C. L. Lieuellen, sergeant, Arlington. Houston has acted as chief of the state traffic department since the retirement of Max Flannery several months ago.

The personnel of the department as now established includes 95 persons, exclusive of the clerical force. Of these officers, 75 will patrol the highways, provide night patrols at strategic points and afford patrolmen to relieve others during their regular periods of time off duty.

Of the force of 95 men, all but 24 are now in the service of the coordinated agencies. These 24 men were selected from a list of 1626 applications received by Mr. Pray.

For the next few months the law enforcement activities of the fish and game commissions will continue under the direction of those activities.

The law creating the new department provides that the superintendent shall receive an annual salary of \$5000, while his deputy will receive \$3600. Captains will receive \$3000 a year, lieutenants \$2400 and sergeants \$2100. Corporals will be paid at the rate of \$1800 a year.

The state police department law was approved by the 1931 legislature, at the request of Governor Meier. Law enforcement agencies absorbed by the new department included the state prohibition bureau, state fire marshal, state game and fish commissions, and the state traffic division.

Mr. Pray declared employees of the department, other than those announced today, would make public within the next week.

State headquarters for the department will be located in the capitol building in Salem. Although not yet determined definitely, it is probable that the department will have use of the state-owned radio broadcasting plant now operated in connection with Oregon State college.

Al Goddard, until recently employed by the state industrial accident commission, has been selected as bookkeeper for the state police department.

Forest Service Men Injured in Dynamite Blast

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—Joe Rainville and Ralph Young, forest service employees, were injured today in a premature dynamite blast on the South Umpqua road near Tillier. The explosion occurred while a fuse was being tamped.

Physicians at the Roseburg hospital, where the two men are being cared for, said Rainville may lose the sight of his right eye. Both men also were cut and bruised.

Former Leader Of Loan Group Placed in Jail

On appearing before presiding Superior Judge Chester A. Batchelor, bail of \$60,000, was set. Unable to post the amount, he was taken to the county jail.

NAVY AIR PROGRAM ACHIEVES RESULTS

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(AP)—The navy's high speed airplane development program already has borne fruit although the funds became available less than a month ago.

Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, chief of the bureau of aeronautics, said today that "preliminary studies have created a new design for patrol planes which will improve their performance."

"Already," he declared, "returns are being received from the stimulating effects of a high speed project."

"The results from a high speed development program are directly applicable to service aircraft. Now the service is in need of an engine of about 1,000 horsepower for patrol planes and airships (lighter than air). If the development program produces, say, an engine of 2,500 horsepower, it will, with minor modifications, make a most reliable 1,000 horsepower service engine."

Admiral Moffett predicted it will take "several years to reach the status existing abroad" in high speed development because congressional appropriations for this purpose were lacking until the last congress allowed \$220,000 which became available July 1.

Child of Three Burns to Death In Barn Flames

FOUNTAIN GREEN, Utah, July 23.—(AP)—Betty Huggins, 3, burned to death in a barn at her home here today. Betty, with her brother June, 6, was playing in the barn while their mother was away. The boy said a lighted match started the fire and he ran for assistance.

When neighbors arrived the child's screams could be heard but it was impossible to enter the building, which burned to the ground. The girl's body was found against a wall after the flames died down.

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FIREMEN RESPOND TO THREE ALARMS

Greatest Number in Single Day for Long Time; Damage Slight

Three fire alarms, the most in any one day in the past two weeks, were turned in to the city department yesterday, the first early in the morning to a house in West Salem, later a grass fire, and in the afternoon, a small blaze in a truck.

Firemen were called to the Larmer garage at 825 North Liberty street at 5:25 p. m. to put out a small blaze which started in short-circuited wiring in a truck on which employees were working. They extinguished it with chemicals without difficulty.

A small grass fire in the 1700 block on South Commercial street was put out at 11:30 a. m. Department Gets West Salem Call

At 4:30 in the morning the department was called to West Salem where the house of C. C. Mohr, 1254 Ruge street, was afire. The blaze, which had evidently started in a davenport, ate a hole through the floor and was coursing up through the walls of the building when the firemen arrived. The two men who answered the call reported back at the central station at 6:30 o'clock.

As no one is said to have been in the house after Wednesday afternoon, it is thought the fire started from a cigarette spark and that the davenport smoldered throughout the night, bursting into flame in the morning hours. The davenport was destroyed.

HOOVER IS PLEASED AT PARLEY RESULT

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(AP)—Led by President Hoover, the American capital tonight hailed the results of the London ministers' conference as a foundation for German economic stability.

Secretary Stimson reported fully by both trans-Atlantic telephone and cable the results of the conference. Acting Secretary of State Clegg laid the reports before the chief executive. Mr. Hoover characterized the conference's work as a contribution to the recovery from the world-wide depression.

He said the conference had laid a "sound foundation for the establishment of stability in Germany," the major banking and credit problem of which had been solved through assurances of co-operative banking action.

The combined effect of his plan for a year's moratorium on inter-governmental debts supplemented by the accomplishments at London, he said, should enable Germany to restore credit.

He paid tribute by name to the principal representatives at the conference for their work.

tary Stimson said, "comes from America and our banks under the leadership of the Federal Reserve system, already have become organized to reassure creditors against the withdrawal of these funds."

The Bank of England, he said, has been taking similar steps and action was promised in the conference of the others of the German creditors. Only at the headquarters of the German delegation was there a lack of enthusiasm over the results of the conference.

While admitting that the Brüning government has secured a breathing spell in its international financial relations by the achievement of the London meeting and the defeat today of the nationalist and communist efforts to convene the Reichstag, Chancellor Brüning and Foreign Minister Curtius are risking their political position, according to the informed German people, unless they take back with them some tangible assurance of new credits.
