

## LIFE SAVING MOVE ON AT PLAYGROUND

Class at 14th Street Will  
Seek Rating; Esther  
Arnold Teacher

Seeking to achieve the standing of Red Cross Junior life savers, 15 boys and eight girls at the 14th street city playground are this week beginning to study in a class conducted by Miss Esther Arnold, supervisor and lifeguard at the grounds. The course in saving swimmers from drowning and resuscitating them requires at least 10 hours of instruction. It is the plan of Miss Arnold to conduct the work daily for the next three weeks. She will direct the girls group from 1:45 to 2:45; the boys from 2:45 to 3:45 o'clock each afternoon.

In addition to the land and water drills at the playgrounds, Mrs. Arnold has arranged for the girls to practice in the Y. M. C. A. tank on Mondays and Thursdays from 9 to 9 a. m. and for the boys, Tuesdays and Fridays from 8 to 9.

When the children have gained proficiency in the life saving methods they will be given a comprehensive examination of their knowledge and skill. The testing will require at least a week's time. The Red Cross award of junior life saver is open to children from 13 to 17 years of age.

## PREMIER OPPOSES HIGH TARIFF WALL

BERLIN, July 28. — (AP) — High tariff walls will lead to universal bankruptcy and the resources of all countries should be used in the interest of international stability. Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain told a delegation of correspondents here today.

One of the prime functions of the statesmen who have been negotiating in recent weeks to alleviate Germany's economic distress, he said, is to restore the proper psychological foundation upon which confidence in the country may be built.

Most of Germany's economic troubles are psychological, he said, and when that detail is properly taken care of prosperity will begin to come back.

The speedy developments of the past few days have knocked all its teeth out of what was originally planned as an unhurried, normal international conference such as that held some weeks ago at Chequers.

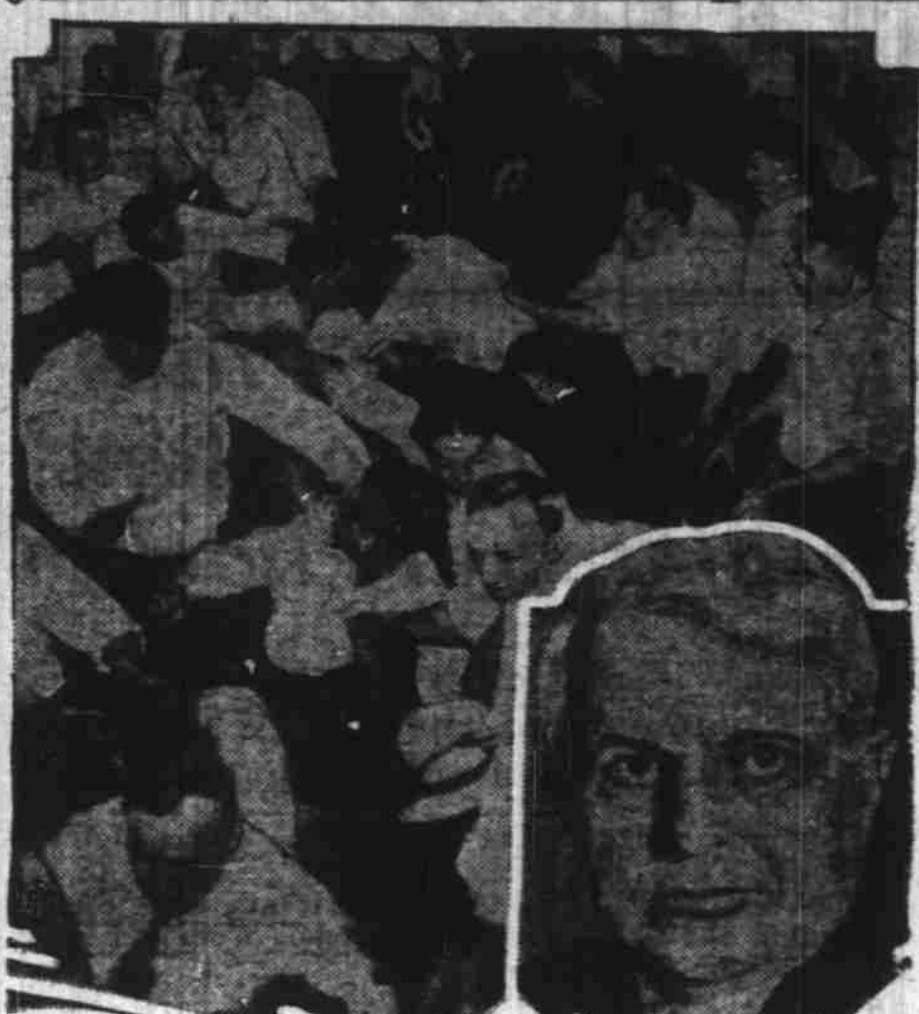
## NEW HEAT WAVE IS EXPERIENCED HERE

RELIEF FURNISHED  
BY FREAK STORMS

LOS ANGELES, July 28.—(AP)—Southwestern America, where a 42 day heat wave killed 78 persons during the last four days, was given a temporary relief today by a combination of freak storms, overcast skies and cooling mountains and ocean breezes. Communities which yesterday experienced temperatures ranging from 106 to 118 degrees, today reported from 86 to 102 and considered it cool inasmuch as winds swept from snow-covered mountain tops and the Pacific. In the Imperial valley, California, where 40 deaths were reported and temperatures ranged from 120 degrees, rain and snow in the mountains brought relief to gasping thousands.

Overcast skies and a night rain lowered temperatures at Taft, Cal., where eggs were fried on a downtown corner in 112 degrees of heat. Two deaths were reported there and farther north two infants died at Fresno, making a three day death toll six. Tulare, Cal., added another death.

A bill authorizing construction of the Wilson river cutoff highway was passed at the 1925 legislative session, but was vetoed by the late Governor Ekstrom. Unemployment and the necessity for additional markets were stressed by the visitors at Tuesday's conference.

A. A. Schramm, superintendent of banks, vs. Martin Burkhardt, respondent, and John Fellows as administrator of estate of Mary F. Burkhardt, deceased, and others, appellants; appeal from Marion county. Suit to determine status of will. Opinion by Justice Rand. Judge McMahon reversed.

George Smith vs. G. W. Laffar, appellant; appeal from Marion county. Suit to recover damages for personal injuries. Opinion by Justice Rand. Judge Kelly reversed.

## Grain Growers To Benefit by Lowered Rates

Considerable benefit to wheat and small grain growers is expected to result from rate reductions between Willamette valley points and Portland, which were announced by railroad officials yesterday. Reductions from 11 1/2 cents per hundred between Salem and Portland to 10 and 10 1/2 cents, effective next Saturday, will permit buyers' prices here to be revised upward.

The total grain shipment out of Salem estimated at 200 to 300 cars a year.

as well as prominent newspapermen will be in the party.

Plans agreed upon here Monday night by the 26 representatives of 11 communities up and down the valley called for extending the invitation to Portlanders to augment the four-lane traffic highway advocates in their appearance before the highway commission. W. B. D. Dodson, general manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, said last night that as yet the matter had not been presented to his organization and that as a consequence, the delegation to urge the widening of the Pacific highway would not include any Portland men when it comes before the highway commissioners.

Will not Oppose  
Champoeg Program  
According to the agreement reached in Salem Monday night, the group from the valley will not offer open opposition to the Champoeg road but will simply concentrate its attack on the necessity of a wider Pacific highway.

The Champoeg super-highway group has issued a statement in which the argument is used that this road would be cheaper in cost than the widening of the present road since right of way could be acquired inexpensively. To widen the Pacific highway it is claimed that at least 20 feet more right-of-way will be needed and the acquisition of this would be expensive, the Champoeg road supporters say. This cost would be especially high in the incorporated towns through which the road runs.

One of the first acts of the committee will be to contest to select a name for a proposed state-wide organization. The original conference was called by Governor Meier and was attended by more than 150 prominent men and women from all sections of Oregon.
