## SPECIAL SESSION DECISION LOOMING

Whether Governor Meier will call a special session of the Oregon legislature to consider a tax reduction program, and lowering of motor vehicle licenses from 25 to 23 1/2 per cent, will not be determined until he has conferred further with the Oregon Tax Equalization and Conservation league. This was announced at the executive department Thursday.

This league recently recommended a special legislative session for the consideration of tax problems. Governor Meier indicated that he had received many replies from legislators, who were asked for an expression regarding the special session. Some of these replies were favorable, while others were unfavorable, he said. In case a special session is called it will not be held until late in August.

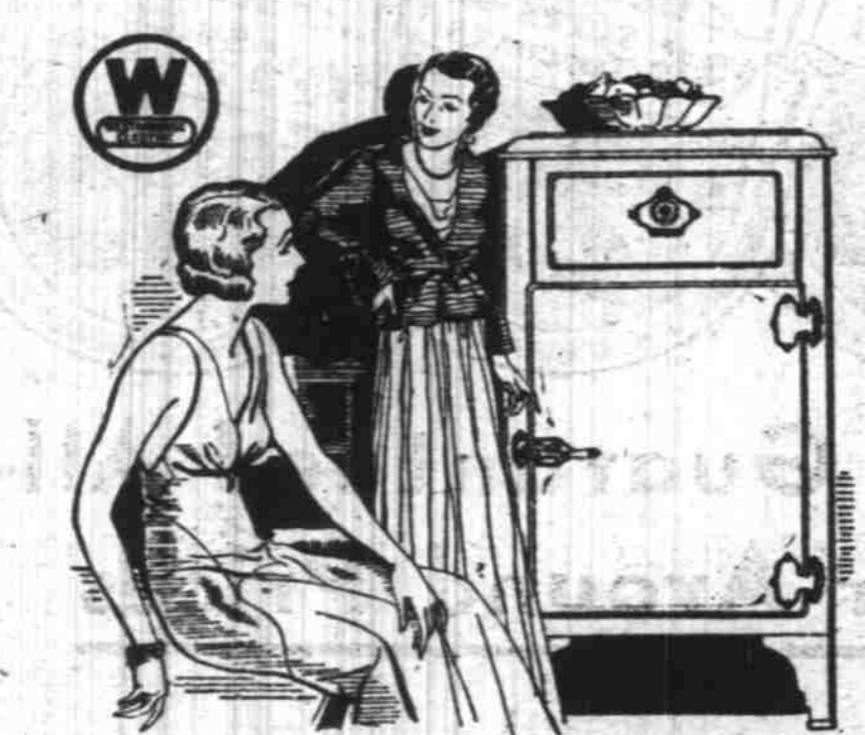
