

MILK WAR NOW PREVAILS HERE

Producers Withhold Supply From Distributors and Establish Depots

Max Gehlhar, director of agriculture for Oregon called a conference of the two groups nearly two months ago in an attempt to prevent the milk war. In a statement last night Mr. Gehlhar said:

"I was hopeful that negotiations would result in agreement. I and my department will be squarely behind the dairymen of Portland and Salem. In my opinion they have done everything in their power to reach an agreement."

Producers declare that since negotiations have been in progress between the two groups the distributors have been actively contracting additional supplies of inferior milk and giving dairymen of C and D class special inducements to raise to B class, thus creating a surplus of more than 15,000 pounds of milk daily. At the producers' meeting last night it was reported that one local distributor had signed up a heavy tonnage of C grade milk for which he was paying \$1.50 per hundred. Aid of city and state health authorities will be sought to prevent any of this inferior milk from being sold in Salem in violation of the city ordinance.

Producers were unanimous last night in the declaration that they would protect Salem children during the milk war and that they would see that a sufficient supply of pure milk was available at all times at the Producers Milk plant on Liberty street just south of the First National bank.

FIVE FACE JUSTICE ON LIQUOR CHARGES

Activities of prohibition officers brought five men into justice court Friday. John Hyland, Earl Coons and R. W. Matthes each entered a plea of guilty to a charge of possession of liquor. Hyland and Matthes paid fines of \$25 and costs. Coons' case was continued until August 13.

F. W. DeWitts pleaded guilty to a charge of sale of intoxicating liquor and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$75 and to serve 20 days in jail. He was unable to pay the fine and was sent to jail to serve his sentence.

F. Leatherwood pleaded not guilty to a charge of sale of liquor and his case will be tried August 3.

Highway Bonds Payment Made

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer sent to the fiscal agency in New York City \$106,000, with which to pay the principal of \$100,000 on outstanding Oregon highway bonds, and interest, due August 1.

The next payment of principal on state highway bonds will be due October 1, 1931. This payment will be in the amount of \$937,500.

Officer Oscar Victor's automobile, which was stolen while he was on his beat in the section near the Southern Pacific depot Thursday night had not yet been recovered early this morning. Victor had parked his car near the station while he was making his rounds.

Garrison Held Not Guilty of Girl's Slaying

SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 31. — (AP)—Moss Edward Garrison, diminutive southerner, was acquitted today of the murder of his 22-year-old sweetheart, pretty Hazel Bradshaw, whose body with 17 knife wounds was found in the artificial Indian village in Balboa park May 3.

A jury of nine men and three women deliberated less than two hours and "Not guilty" was the unanimous vote on the first ballot.

Garrison, 37-year-old former commissary clerk, showed no emotion as the foreman handed the verdict to Superior Judge L. N. Turrentine. His demeanor of calm assurance maintained throughout the two weeks' trial did not leave him as the clerk read the verdict.

SECONDARY ROADS PROGRAM IS EYED

The Marion county court has five more months in which to determine what highways will be offered to the state as secondary highways subject to state funds being appropriated for their maintenance or construction and a considerable portion of this period will be needed for the proper determination of the roads, members of the county court said yesterday.

Under the 1931 secondary road law, Marion county will receive through the state about \$75,000 a year for its secondary roads but the money must be spent under state supervision and approval. With 400 miles of market roads already constructed and with at least 40 miles on the market road map but not completed, the court expects to have a real problem in determining the roads to be placed on the secondary road map.

All other roads, market or county, must be maintained by the county with county funds.

ACTIONS TO SECURE MONEYS ARE FILED
