Labish Growers in Happy Mood; Crop Of Onions is Short

LAKE LABISH, Aug. 6.—One with a faculty for observing such things would be sure to note a certain sprightliness of demeanor, a certain brightness in the eye of local farmers these days. The reason is perfectly simple: The farmers grow onions, and, according to government reports, there is the greatest onion shortage in 10 years imminent.

According to the report, the early onions are moving rapidly, and there will be no surplus. A few hundred acres' shortage nationally makes considerable difference to the local onion men, for onions, like peppermint oil, go a long way, some statisticians having calculated that there are a hundred pounds of potatoes eaten for every pound of onions. What Labish needs is a press agent to make the nation onion conscious.

'Spud' Race is Scio's Stunt On Saturday

SCIO, August 6.—Scio will again be the scene of interesting contests next Saturday, when a nail-driving contest, a potato race and a fat man's race will be staged here. Women from 20 years up to 10,000, it is announced, will be eligible to enter the nail-driving race, while the potato race will be open only to women over 25, who are married. HARVEST HELD LOW IN PRATUM AREA

PRATUM, Aug. 6.—Threshing will soon be a thing of the past in this community, with many empty sacks held by farmers who expected more than they received. Much grain had a thin stand, causing a reduction in yield. There is also a large range of difference between various fields, some as low as 10 bushels of wheat per acre, while P. Bischoff had one field of wheat yielding 44 bushels to the acre. The average for both wheat and oats will probably be somewhere between 30 and 35 bushels an acre.

Although the depression financially among farmers is more real than most of them have so far realized, a number of improvements are being made in spite of it. Recently V. J. Krehbiel built a hollow tile pumphouse, for which D. Vogt & Son were the masons. Also at least two new houses are in course of construction.

Otto Butler, whose house burned down about two months ago, is building a fine modern home, and Mr. Schlegel, who recently purchased eight acres from Charles Sappingfield, is building a fine cozy cottage on it. Anton Dorn will live there and have charge of the farm.

ONION HOUSES AT LABISH REPAIRED

LAKE LABISH, August 6.—Hayes' Labish Farms have a sizeable crew at work repairing their onion houses. Last season a considerable number of onions spoiled because of roof leakage and improper ventilation. New ventilators are being constructed and the houses renovated generally. The houses contain rows of movable shelves on either side of the middle drive; there is close to a foot of space left between the shelves and the shelf above, allowing the air to circulate properly. Onion pulling is scheduled to begin the latter part of the current month. No shortage of labor is anticipated.
