

FIRE DESTROYS FARM DWELLING

Ferschweiler and son Jump From Window as Blaze Threatens Them

GERVAIS, August 12.—Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the seven room house of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Ferschweiler four miles west of Gervais at noon Tuesday. Mrs. Ferschweiler had prepared dinner for a crowd of men who were hauling clover and it was while they were getting ready to eat that the alarm of fire was given.

The piano, washing machine, a few dishes and only a few garments were the only things saved. Furniture, clothing and electrical equipment, being among the valuable articles destroyed. The loss is estimated at about \$2,000, partly covered by insurance.

Mr. Ferschweiler will rebuild, but does not know just when. The family is already moving into the garage and a tent where they will live until other arrangements can be made.

Ferschweiler and son went to the upper story to try to save some of their furniture and were hemmed in and had to jump out of the window. The 13-year-old daughter, went into the burning building for the key to the family car and in so doing sustained several minor burns. The stairway collapsed soon after Mrs. Ferschweiler had come downstairs.

WOODBURN, August 12.—Fire-fighting equipment from Woodburn was called out of town Tuesday afternoon to help extinguish a blaze at a farm northwest of St. Louis. The small fire truck, which is permitted to leave the city limits, arrived too late to extinguish the blaze at the Ferschweiler home.

A small coupe being driven by Frank Campeau crashed into the back end of the fire truck when the truck came to a sudden halt at one of the road turns. Leaders on the fire truck rammed through two of the glass windows of Campeau's car. It is alleged that Campeau was driving too close behind the fire truck and was looking for the blaze and did not see the truck stop so suddenly.
