Large Area on Canada Border Is Threatened

PERNIE, B. C., Aug. 18. (AP)—Forest fires which destroyed 16 houses and two churches as Elko, 25 miles south of here last night, continued to threaten the entire country along the international border between Montana and Canada.

Fire fighters were patrolling the area between Oliver, Bridesville and Rock Creek, trying to conquer five separate fires.

The fire, which due to a sudden shift of the wind jumped the Elk river and swept Elko, has been eating its way toward the south-east since it started two weeks ago despite a small army of fighters.

All of the fires in the Oliver district are said to be of incendiary origin and one man has been arrested, charged with having attempted to set a blaze in the woods near there.

HOP PICKERS GIVEN AID IN RECREATION

Playground for Children, Shows Each Night Plan At Lakebrook Yard

One of the most comprehensive recreational programs for agricultural employees anywhere in the country will be begun today at the Lakebrook hopyard of T. A. Liveday, under the direction of Ellen Nelson and Wesley Heise, both experienced supervisors of this type of work. A daily schedule of activities for pickers and their children will be carried out each day, running from early in the morning until 9:30 at night during the season.

With picking to start tomorrow morning, hundreds of the field laborers will be pouring into the campgrounds all of today and probably during the night, until the crew of 1200 to 1500 persons is on hand.

The supervisors will direct the children who are not working, in regular playground activities such as story hours, craftwork and games. They expect to care for from 25 to 100 children each day. Besides this work they will handle the twice-daily postal service, publish the bi-weekly paper, Hopvine Scratch, and get acquainted with the pickers while they work in the yards.

Shows Will Be Given Each Night

Each night there will be a show of some sort. Four times a week a silent movie will be presented. The other three evenings will be taken up with either professional vaudeville or home talent programs. From 8:45 to 9:30 o'clock, a campfire program of songs and games will be held for all the employees and their families. Lights are turned out at 10 o'clock.

As soon as the schedule is put into smooth working order, an athletic program will be organized, with ball games to be played each evening and a track meet on week ends. Races will be held this year as before, admission will be granted only to the workers, it has been decided.

Mrs. Nelson has had wide experience in this type of work. She has taken part in chautauques activities, and been supervisor of a Tacoma playground and this year of the Lincoln playground here. Heise, a junior at Oregon State college, served as one of the recreation directors at Lakebrook last season.

Oil Output Cut Two-Fifths by Governors' Act

KILGORE, Tex., Aug. 18. (AP)—Approximately two-fifths of the crude oil production of the United States had been cut off tonight by the spectacular action of two men—Governors W. H. Murray of Oklahoma and Ross S. Sterling of Texas.

The shutdown of the great east Texas field—largest in the country—was completed today under martial law, stemming the rush of petroleum that overwhelmed the industry and drove prices to the lowest level in midcontinent history.

Flush wells in Oklahoma, closed two weeks ago by Governor Murray, remained under martial law and the Oklahoma executive reiterated the shutdown would continue until purchasing companies raised the price to \$1 a barrel.
