Claggett and Howe, Staff in This County are Not Retained

Charles Pray, superintendent of state police, yesterday announced names of officers in the department of state police, who will be assigned to the law enforcement activities previously carried on by the state game commission. Neither Ben Claggett or Ben Howe, deputy game wardens working in this territory heretofore, were named by Pray. He said he had made his appointments after recommendation by the game department and that the majority of the 35 new appointees were previously employed as deputy game wardens.

The new officers will operate under the direction of Charles H. McClees, for several years law enforcement supervisor for the state game commission. McClees receives the rank of captain. Payment for the officers' wages will be made from state game commission funds.

District No. 1 will be in charge of Sergeant John H. Price, with headquarters at Newport. Edward Walker will be in charge of district No. 2. Headquarters of this district will be at Medford. Art M. Fish will have charge of district No. 3 and U. S. Davis cup player.
