# PEACHES MORE PLENTIFUL, FIRM WHEAT PRICE DECLINES ONE CENT

### Crawford Supply yet Scarce, Command Top Prices

PORTLAND, Aug. 21—(AP)—Greater offerings of peaches on the East Side Farmers' market today found a rather fair demand with little, if any, material change in the price. Crawford peaches were in small supply and sold up to 35-90c with Elbertas spreading 75-85c, Muirs 65-85c and J. H. Hale \$3.50-1.25 box.

Tomato market was fairly steady; mostly 50c for 1s although some business was shown a dime better. Strawberries mostly \$2 crate. Raspberries in small supply sold mostly \$1.75 crate; a few higher. Blackberries moved around 80c crate.

Danish squash was 50c for lugs and \$1.10 for cantaloupe crates. Dallas egg plant was 75-90c for 100 lbs. Plums sold mostly 40c box with Italian prunes as well as date prunes 30c box generally. Few down to a quarter.

Corn was generally 50c sack with a few selections 45-75c. Squash was nominally 35c flat crate.

Garlic found a fair call around a nickel a pound. Bell peppers were 30-35c box with hot stock 40c.

Beans were slightly better at 2c lb.; a few higher. Apples were a trifle slow at 60-90c box for jumble pack. Bartlett pears held mostly at \$1 for jumble pack.

Local muskmelons were \$1 crate with cantaloupes showing a spread \$4.50-1 generally. Cabbage market was fairly steady.

# Eggs Advance a Cent, Also Heavy Hens On Mart Here

Wheat took another cent decline today, with local buyers offering 31 and 34 cents to the growers.

Egg prices also are up a cent, producers receiving 30 cents for extras and 16 cents for mediums the past two days.

Heavy hens commanded another cent, the raise bringing the quotation to 17 cents. Medium and light hens remain at 12 and 10 cents, respectively.

# 'Sport' Variety Of Prune Found

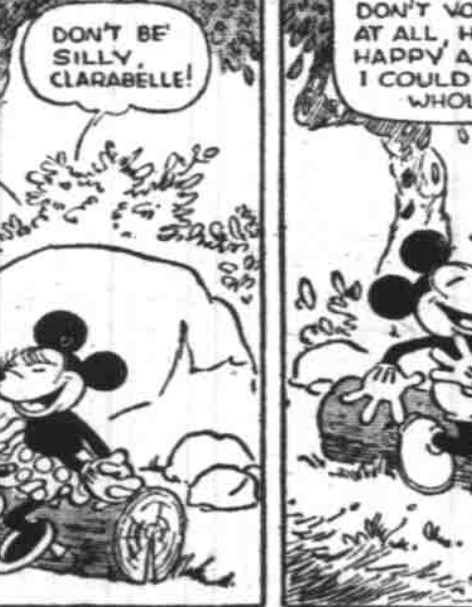

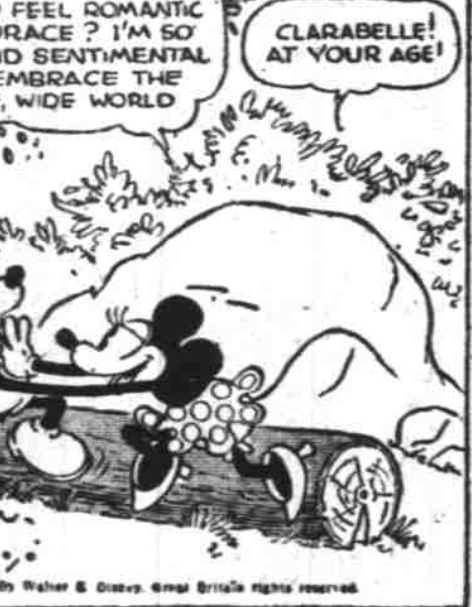
