

OVER TWO BILLIONS INSURANCE CARRIED

More Than 40 Millions Paid On Premiums, Claims Paid \$19,501,824

More than two and one-quarter billion dollars in insurance of various classifications was in force in 603 companies operating in Oregon at the close of the year 1930, according to a report completed Wednesday by A. H. Averill, state insurance commissioner.

The report was filed with Governor Meier. These companies collected an aggregate of \$40,573,438 in premiums and paid \$19,501,824 in loss claims during the year. Of the total amount of insurance outstanding on December 31, 1930, approximately 230 stock fire and underwriting subsidiaries and 30 mutual fire companies carried an aggregate of \$1,350,599,635 or more than one-half of the total insurance. Seventy-eight life insurance companies carried \$12,834,190 or 467,363 Oregon policyholders. The remainder was written in health, accident, property damage, liability and miscellaneous classes of business. The companies writing fire insurance collected a total of \$8,-

NEW BID MADE ON U. S. LINES LEASE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—A low high bid for the United States lines was made today by International Mercantile Marine-Roadway Steamship company on condition it be granted the same terms as Paul W. Chapman of New York, the present operator who is seeking to retain the lines.

In an open hearing before the shipping board called at his own request, P. A. S. Franklin of New York, president of I. M. M.-Roadway strongly protested what he termed the granting of "preferential rights" to Chapman and his backers R. Stanley Dollar, San Francisco, and Kenneth D. Dawson, Portland.

He said the Chapman interests had been allowed to make modification in their offer after bids had been opened, as "modified," he said, it would permit Chapman to operate the Leviathan only five trips a year and at their discretion to use two new ships in the transpacific or intercoastal services instead of the north Atlantic.

previous five-year period, 1925 to 1929. Payment of Claims Shows Increase

Net claims amounting to \$9,608,895 were paid to Oregon policyholders and beneficiaries in 1930 which was an increase of 9 per cent over 1929 and 33.5 per cent over the average years for the previous five-year period. Premiums collected in 1930 totaled \$22,271,764, representing an increase of 4 per cent over the receipts for 1929 and 21.3 per cent over the yearly average for the five-year period immediately preceding.

During 1930 the department issued 651 licenses to insurance companies, including additional titles, and 18,217 agents' licenses, a reduction in the latter case of 675 as compared to 1929. Thirty-six new companies were admitted to the state during the report year and there were 17 withdrawals, making a net gain of 19 companies licensed to transact business in Oregon. The total departmental receipts from all sources for 1930 amounted to \$843,147.34 and the disbursements amounted to \$40,718.79 leaving a cash balance of \$802,428.55 which was turned into the general fund of the state treasury.

While the volume of revenue for 1930 increased 3.3 per cent over that of 1929 and the clerical work incidental thereto in proportion, the reports state, the ratio of disbursements to revenue increased but nine tenths of one per cent.

SECRET POLICE OF N. Y. WATCH GANGS

Men who Haven't Walked Beats Join "Mobs" to Ferret out Facts

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Thirty young men, who look like high school boys and have never wielded a night stick nor worn a bluecoat's uniform, are the main reliance of police in their drive to clean up the underworld. They constitute the secret service squad formed two years ago as an experiment by Grover Whalen, then police commissioner. Officials said they look to them, more than to any other of the 19,000 men on the force, to strike at the roots of organized crime. Private detective agencies gave police the idea for the experiment. Years ago the Molly Maguires, a mob which worked one of the original American rackets in the coal fields of Pennsylvania, defied police, shot judges, murdered their enemies with reckless abandon and laughed at attempts to jail them. Private Detective John Famous Gang A detective from a private agency made friends with some of the Molly Maguires, joined them and worked himself into a high executive post. When the announcement came 19 of the Molly Maguires went to the gallows. That is the way the 30 youthful secret service men here are working. They are known to few on the force except their immediate superiors. They never loiter around police stations. They generally travel alone on their perilous missions—perilous because

they are anathema to criminals, who would arrange the most violent sort of death for them if they could only spot them. They are not limited to any type of work, except that they specialize in what police call "strong-arm" crime, involving the use of firearms, explosives, threats and torture. Squad Has Done Important Work Police officials disclosed today that the squad, which began with a handful of men in 1929, is constantly being strengthened and enlarged. Its members generally are picked from the police training school. For to be successful they must not bear the mark of a "cop," which comes with years of patrolling a beat. The most recent achievement of the "roppers," as police call them, was the capture of a dangerous mob of gamblers in the Catskills. One member of the squad has been killed. On his deathbed he wrote with trembling fingers the names of his assassins. Indictments recently were voted against them.
