# **EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS**

Application of Dorr E. Keasey company of Portland for excl sive sales rights of state-owned property taken over by the World war veterans state aid commission, was rejected at a meeting of the commission held in Salem Friday. Members of the commission said such a contract would be contrary to public policy. The applicants offered to handle the sale of these preperties on a 10 per cent commission basis.

Records of the commission show that since 1928 property sales aggregating \$658,000 and leases to talling \$114,000 have been band-

talling \$114,000 have been handled at on expense of only three per cent. Jerrold Owen, secretary of the commission, said that approximately 40 per cent of the sales have been handled by state employes without the payment of any commission. In a few cases the regular commission has been pald in selling the properties.
