

1 CHANGES ARE MADE AT STATE LIBRARY

Interior Rearranged to add Convenience, in Work **Of Handling Books**

Early fall house cleaning has been progressing at the state library with the result that a reorganized interior presents a high-ly efficient appearance. The work was done with little expense inapmuch as the greatest change comes in the unifying of departments. A coat of soft tinted cream paint adds much to the light effect and cheerful appearance of the interior.

The discharging and charging department has been moved into one room and the system chang-ed in order to allow for more efficient work. In this department antiquated desks have been replaced with modern desk arrangement. The unwrapping of incoming packages which formerly was done upstairs is now done in the basement and the litter from this is kept out of the main part of the library.

The cataloguing room had had to share space with part of the ad-ministrative department and that has now been changed so that all the administrative department is located in one section of the library and the cataloguing room is given over completely to that use.

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
