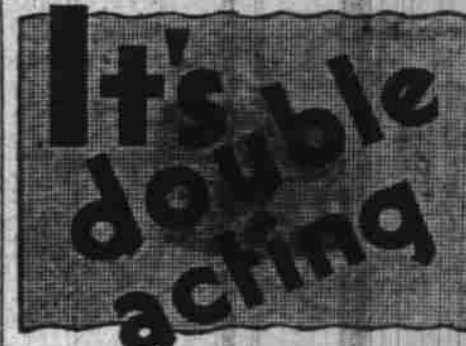
## Devotional Service Led by Miss Sophie Townsend
