Saturday was the first program and at least 1000 people listened to the presentation and applauded with great enthusiasm. ## Smart Clothes, Sleek Horses, Guests, Parties, Thrills, Equal Horse Show

THE thrill of the state fair horse show will be a matter of realization Monday night at 8 o'clock when a group of 17 sleek novice hunters enter the flag and bunting draped tan bark arena of the horse show stadium.

Not a few boxes will be filled for this first night. Smart clothes, an air of sophistication, brilliant performance of animals, horsemen, and horsewomen, all will stir the pulse of the horse show audience—an audience which seldom fails in sportsmanship and keen appreciation.

The horse show this year has taken on added interest for all lovers of fine horses.

New exhibitors are here and perhaps the finest string of show horses to be presented to Salem audiences. One interesting string is that owned and handled in the ring by E. Philip Schandien of Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Mr. Schandien is an interesting person in himself. He is young, a bachelor and distinguishes himself in the ring not only by his horsemanship but by his English mess jacket which he wears. His "Oxford Hound Leopard" won the harness horse stake at Menlo Park and at Stockton this past fall. He has other winners which will top many a stake it is expected.

Speaking of interesting horsemen who will appear, there is George Howell who will show the horses of L. R. Bank, president of the Portland Hunt club. "My home is in Kentucky, but I came west last year," said Mr. Howell. "As if anyone would have to be told he came from Kentucky after hearing him talk." He is a wonderful horseman as Salem audiences know from his former appearances here.

Another thrilling person in the ring is Hilda McCormick, who handles her horses with perfect control and grace. To date no more attractive horsewoman has ever been on the tan bark at Salem than Hilda McCormick. She will show her own horses this year as well as ride for other exhibitors.

- 1/2 Cup walnuts
- 1 Tablespoon onion
- 1 Tablespoon parsley
- 2 Eggs
- 1/2 Cup milk
- 2 Tablespoons butter
- Salt and pepper to taste

Put bread crumbs, carrots, walnuts, onion and parsley through food chopper. Mix thoroughly and add eggs, milk, butter, salt and pepper. Steam two hours, unmoiled on platter and cover with a rich white sauce.
