No. 12 "Corn Casserole" Mrs. V. E. Burson Salem

Cover the bottom of casserole with 1 1/2 cups of Snowflake bread crumbs. Add 1 pint of canned corn, salted to taste, and 2-3 cup of sweet milk. Sprinkle over this rather cup of bread crumbs and 3 tablespoons of butter cut in small pieces. Cover top with one cup of grated cheese. One small green pepper chopped fine and added to the cheese makes this very good but it is optional. Bake in oven at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes. Serve hot. If a creamy canned corn is used, do not use more than 1/2 cup of milk.
