In addition the chorus will stage its regular charity benefit and a "circus" is being planned. H. H. Hulsey, Salem representative to the grand lodge at Seattle last July, will make a report of his trip in the near future, the Elket states.

Miss Anderson's outline for this unique study course was published in "Home Economic News," a national publication. Miss Helen E. Tooke, an instructor of blind and deaf girls, attending the Percy Hughes school in Syracuse, N. Y., noticed the outline in that magazine and wrote to the author for further information and to obtain copies of the plan. She stated that she was inspired by the idea and thought she could use it to advantage in her own classes.

As a result of the training received from two angles, that of a number of young women were able to get good positions as domestic servants. The outline originated by Miss Anderson covers in detail matters of the domestic service, from two angles, that of the personality, appearance and conduct of the servant, and that of her duties, such as general housework and cooking.

Property bequeathed by Lotta Chase Smith, deceased, to the board of directors of the Church of Christ Scientist, for use of the Christian Science Monitor, is not exempt from payment of inheritance tax, regardless of an opinion to the contrary handed down by the Multnomah county circuit court September of this year. This was held in an opinion prepared yesterday by Attorney General VanWinkle.

"It seems to me," Attorney General VanWinkle's opinion reads, "that the terms of the bequest itself clearly exclude such bequest from inheritance tax exemption. The bequest was not limited by

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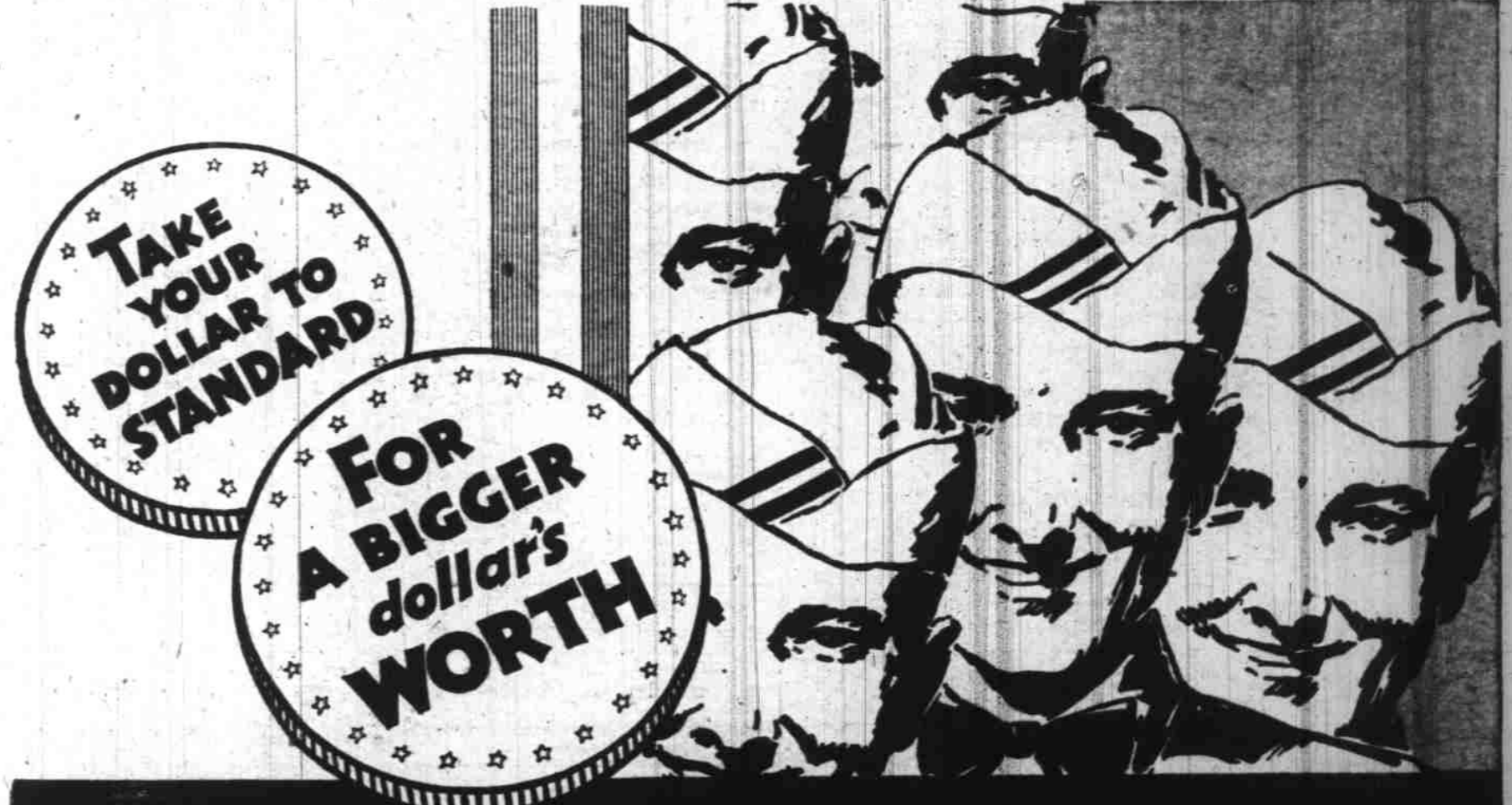
