## CHURCH RALLY TO BE TUESDAY

### Bishop Lowe and two Other Outstanding Leaders to Be Speakers

H. K. Mondol of India, who was in Salem a year ago, will be one of the speakers for the Methodist rally to be held Tuesday night at the First M. E. church here. Mr. Mondol will substitute for Dr. Ram Chandra Rao, originally scheduled but was delayed on his trip from India.

The program will be the center of Methodist interest for 40 of the churches convenient to Salem, reaching as far north as Newberg, as far south as Corvallis, east to Silverton and Stayton and west to Tillamook and Nehalem. The banquet program will begin at 5:30 p. m. when Dr. Bert Smith of Chicago will be the speaker.

At the 8 o'clock mass meeting in the church auditorium, Bishop Titus Lowe of the Portland area and H. K. Mondol will be the speakers.

Wednesday morning at 9:30 o'clock pastors will assemble for a round table on present problems, evangelism and world service.

## ACNE NOT SERIOUS BUT CAUSES WORRY

### Due to Infection, Although Communication Rare; Glands to Blame

People will bear up philosophically under an incapacitating illness or even where one threatens life, whereas the moment they suffer from a relatively trivial ailment affecting their personal appearance, they are distressed beyond measure. Most people worry more about pimples on the face than they do about a malignant disease.

The medical-dental headquarters of the Polk-Marion-Yamhill county medical society declares that most of the pimples which people have caused little trouble to their health. Most of these disturbances are caused by the excessive secretions of the skin glands.

"Few serious diseases so completely upset the mental equilibrium of the girls and the collegiate as ordinary acne," declares the bulletin issued this week. "For pure pathos, one has but to recall the school girl looking sadly at the mirror, or the girl in the mirror at her mottled complexion and then glancing enviously at the billboard picture of the woman with that school girl complexion."

"The tragic thing about the pimple is that it breaks out ruthlessly on the most conspicuous part of the body and at an age when everyone is extremely anxious to look his best.

"It is important to recognize the fact that the pimple itself is due to infection. For this reason, it is unsafe to use the same towels as a person with acne; but, as a matter of fact, it is not easy to spread the infection to the healthy skin by the towel. Apparently the soil must be prepared for the infection, that is, the skin with the over-active sebaceous glands resulting in the formation of blackheads, is the one on which pimples are prone to develop. If the sebaceous glands are not over-active, pimples are rare."

## CRABTREE STATION AGENT IS REMOVED

The public utilities commissioner Friday authorized the Southern Pacific company to discontinue its depot agent at Crabtree, providing that the station be placed in charge of a caretaker and kept open to the public.

The railroad company requested permission to discontinue its agent at Crabtree, on a showing that the business of the station had declined more than 100 per cent during the past two years.

Petitions signed by more than 50 residents of the Crabtree district, protesting against discontinuance of depot facilities, were filed with the utilities commissioner.

The commissioner dismissed a protest of citizens of North Plains against the closing of the depot of the United Railways at that place.

## Woman Suffrage Voted for Spain

MADRID, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Congress has written women's suffrage into the constitution under which the republic of Spain is to be governed.

The measure sets the voting age at 23. It is estimated 5,000,000 women—or approximately the number of men enjoying suffrage—will be affected.
