## ON VACATION | NOUSTRY OF SEED POTATOES VIEWED

Congressman Hawley Makes Trip With Agent and O. S. C. Professor

Congressman W. C. Hawley has just returned from an inspection tour of the potato industry in Clackamas county. The tour was under the management of J. J. Inskeep, county agent, Professor Jackman, of Oregon State college, and Fred S. Perrine, of the Oregon City chamber of commerce, for the purpose of observing, in the fields, the value of planting certified stock and using good cultural methods.

There are some 70 diseases that

affect the potato industry, many of which affect the plants above ground and can be detected upon inspection in the field, all of which tend to limit the number of potatoes in a hill or prevent their proper growth and maturity. Some of the diseases poison the ground for a period of five years. The party saw some magnificent fields of potatoes, practically lear of all diseases. Such results were accomplished by proper tillage of the soil and the planting of some raised their own seed stock in separate plots, selecting the seed for such plots as they are dug in the field. While the seed plots are growing the farmers continually rogue all plants, that is, pull out the plants with their potatoes, that show anything other than a perfectly healthy appearance

Good Market Found For Certified Seed

Clackamas county is finding a good market for her certified seed stock, as well as her fine potatoes grown from good seed and the opportunity for development is excellent. As they now are producing the quality, it is necessary to increase the quantity so that they may be shipped in trainload lots.
