2 cups Snowflake bread crumbs green peppers, chopped fine red pepper, chopped fine pint strained tomatoes

4 eggs 1 cup bacon or ham chopped 3 medium onions chopped fine

1/4 teaspoon paprika 1 1 teaspoon salt

1 1 tablespoon butter

1 tablespoon sugar and a dash of cayenne

Strain tomatoes over bread and let soak. Beat yolks and add to this. Then add all other ingredients except whites of eggs and stir thoroughly. Beat the whites until dry and fold in. Grease hot skillet and pour in omelet and cook. Serve immediately.
