

Meetings Stir Salem Women To Plans and Preparations This Month

A LARGE number of the club women of both Salem, Marion county, the state and the northwest are busy with plans and arrangements for conventions to be held in Salem and Eugene this month.

From the seven Zonta clubs of the northwest, Seattle, Olympia, Everett, Spokane, Tacoma, Portland and Salem, delegates will come to Salem October 24 to be here for the district E conference of the club. Miss Mary Davenport, district chairman, of Spokane will preside.

Registration will be done at the Marion hotel and the business meetings will be held in the chamber of commerce rooms. Aside from the business meetings outstanding social plans are being made to entertain the guests.

Saturday noon a luncheon will compliment the visitors at the Silver Grill room of the Gray Belle. A speaker will address the group at this time and special music will be given. Lena Belle Tarter has charge of the music. The American Legion auxiliary quartet will appear on the programs as well as other local musical talent.

Following the business session Saturday afternoon the guests will be taken for a scenic tour of Salem and surrounding territory and this drive will end at the American Indian school where Miss Gertrude Eakin will be hostess for a delightful tea at 4 o'clock. She will be assisted by teachers at the school and students will give the program. The name of the club, "Zonta" is an Indian name and the Salem club feels that this tea will be most appropriate given at the Indian school.

Saturday night will be observed with a banquet at the Marion hotel where a speaker and special music will add to the charm of the evening. Special stunts are being arranged for this night by Miss Kathryn Gunnell. La Verne Winkler, Dorothy Pearce, Helen Louise Crosby, have charge of the banquet arrangements.

Miss Hazel Cook, Ruby Morris, Kathryn Gunnell are working out plans for an attractive Sunday morning breakfast which will conclude the district conference. About 75 women are expected to attend the conference.

Salem will also receive a large number of club women from the federated women's clubs of Marion county October 29 in the Woman's clubhouse with the Etokta Woman's club as hostess. Mrs. J. G. Fontaine is president. There will be representatives from at least 20 clubs who will gather at 10 o'clock for this all-day session. The major project of the club is consideration of better farm homes and this will be carried out in various projects and talks during the session.

Plans have been made for a no host luncheon at noon the place and the exact time to be announced later. There will also be a president's roundtable. The third large convention meeting for club women will be the American Association of University Women, state convention, to meet October 16 and 17 in Eugene.

Books discussed were "Jenny Lind" story of the great singer's life; "My Father," by Clara Clemens, a story of the life of Mark Twain; "Life and Letters of Edmund Gosse," eminent English critic; and best of all biographies, "Leonard Wood, a biography" by Haerman Hagedorn. This is in two volumes.

Books not biography spoken of by Miss Long were "Epic of America," by James Truslow Adams, a survey of American life; "The Brown Decades, 1865 to 1895" by Lewis Mumford; "End of the World and Back Again," McSpadden, a book of travel; "A Yankee in Patagonia," Robert and Catherine Barrett, also a book of travel; "Basque People," David Casfield; "Shadows of the Rock a sketch of French life, by Cather; "Young Mrs. Melgus," Elizabeth Corbett, a story of an old woman 80 years old who goes out to live again.

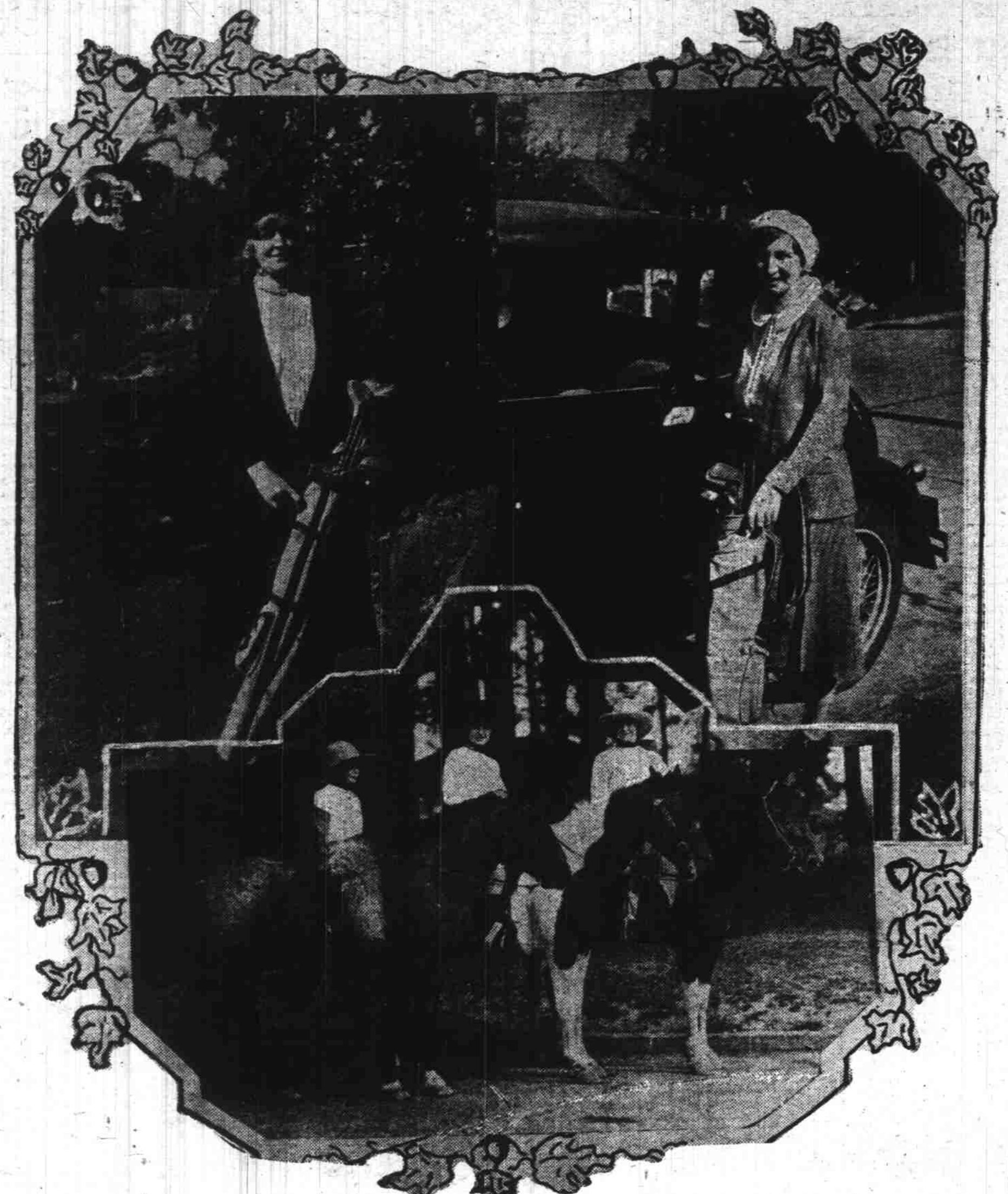

Prize Recipe

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No. 15 "Spanish Omelet" Eloise Smith Salem

- 2 cups Snowflake bread crumbs
- 3 green peppers, chopped fine
- red pepper, chopped fine
- 1 pint strained tomatoes
- 4 eggs
- 1 cup bacon or ham chopped fine
- 3 medium onions chopped fine
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 tablespoon sugar and a dash of cayenne
- Strain tomatoes over bread and let soak. Beat yolks and add to this. Then add all other ingredients except whites of eggs and stir thoroughly. Beat the whites until dry and fold in. Grease hot skillet and pour in omelet and cook. Serve immediately.



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
