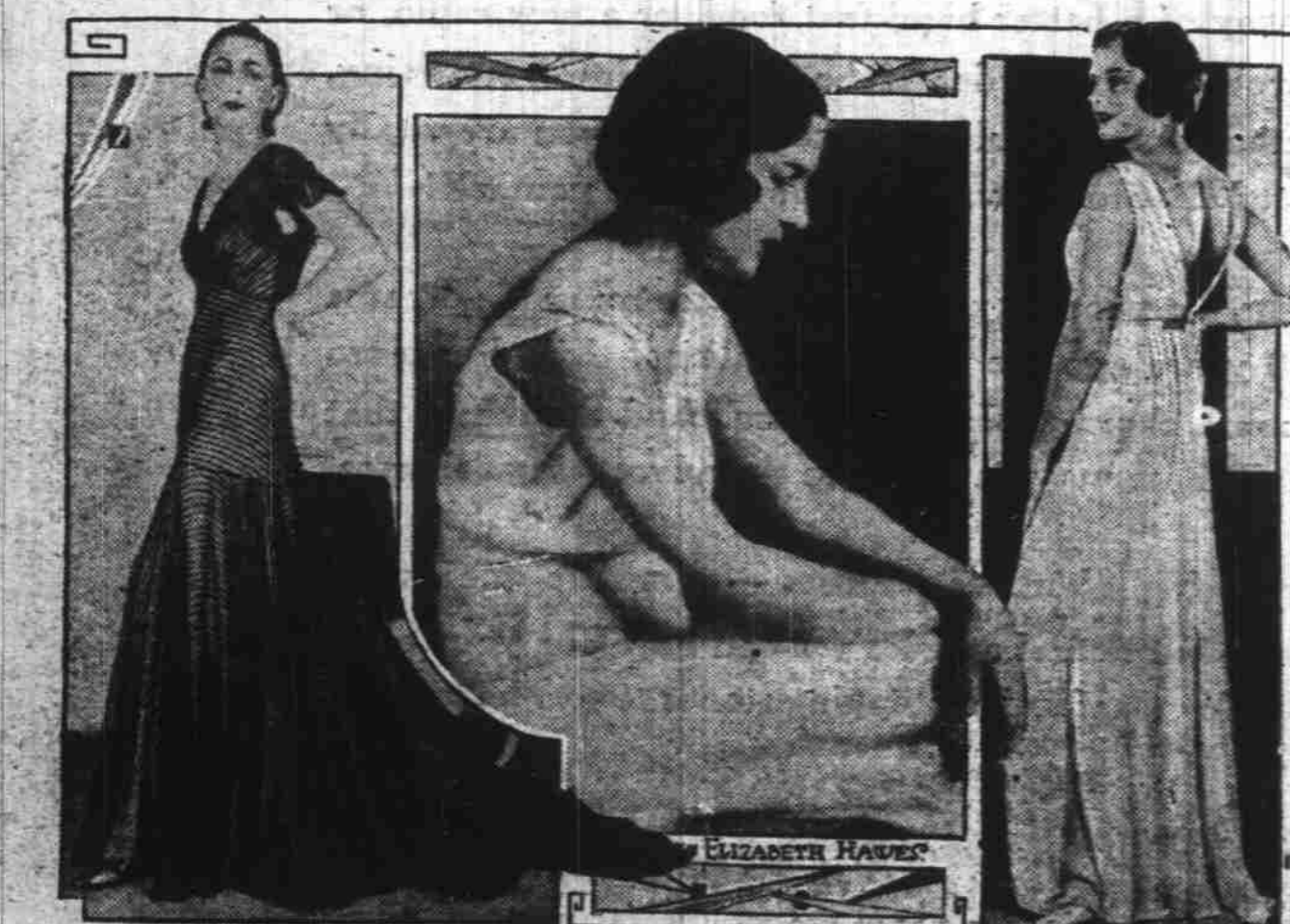
At the close of the evening program the finance committee will meet and Dr. E. S. Hammond will begin a series of six studies in teacher training for the church school.
