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PARK TRAILS WILL BE STARTED SOON

About ten or more men are soon to be given work on the development of forest trails through the Silver Falls park which was lately acquired by the state highway commission.

In a report to County Judge Siegmund Monday, Sam Boardman, park man for the state commission, outlined roughly by map some of the trails to be made. Some of the work has already been done but eight or ten miles more of trail will be put in this winter according to his report.

Since no camp will be established at the falls these men will all be picked from the surrounding neighborhood, so that they will be able to live at home thus avoiding the necessity and expense of keeping up a camp.

The building of the new trails will make it possible for the many visitors to the park to view the countless and varied beauty spots including the falls which will be accessible with the carrying out of the plans.
