Prehistoric People Roamed Lands

O'er Which Old Spanish Trail Ran; Now 'Tis Known Only as Liberty

The Liberty district is four miles south of Salem on the Liberty road, which branches off the Pacific highway about three

Relies have been found in Liberty showing that a phehistoric race of people practiced the rites of phallicism and sun worship here, similar to that observed in Pompel and Egypt thousands of years ago, and still carried on to this day by the Dravidian races of India. These relics are now in the State college museum, taken

there by Prof. J. B. Horner, dean of the department of history.

The old Spanish Trail passed through here, coming from the north and turning westward where the road still branches at the store, passed over Ankeny hill to Humphrey's ferry and on to Sonoma, joining there with El Camino Real, the king's highway, in the days of California's Spanish and Mexican rule.

In the spring and fall the California fur brigades of the Hudsons' Bay company, passed over this trail from old Fort Vancouver, after it was built in 1824. The famous Bishop Simpson passed over this trail in March, 1854 to attend the Belknap Methodis conference, the first in the north part of the country. He praised this country here and the views from the hills very highly and at great length in his biography. Also on this Spanish trail stood the "governor's mansion" the home of Governor John P. Gaines, territorial executive of Oregon in 1850-53.

In the late seventies a postoffice was estab-lished and maintained until the rural mail, Postoffice in 70s delivery was started in the late nineties. At first the postoffice was kept at several different homes in success sion until a store was built, when it also contained the postoffice. In the late eightles and early nineties the Oregon Land com-

pany, managed by Dr. H. J. Minthorn and B. S. Cook, (and for whom Herbert Hoover worked as a youngman) divided up most of the land and later sold it off as developed prune orchards. Changes Worked tensively raised here as well as smaller acreages of apples, grain, hay, etc. There are numerous prune driers, a prune packing plant, several dairies, and rabbit and fox farms. A great deal of labor is employed here in the fruit seasons.

There is a well equipped standard four room school, a general store, and a community hall. Organizations are: a non-denominational Sunday school, Woman's club, Community club and the Red Hills grange.
