Both Russia and S. America Curtail Offerings and Price Here Gains

Domestic wheat markets continued firm during the week ending October 30 and prices advanced to the highest point of the season, according to the weekly grain market review of the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics. Increased export demand for North American wheat, as a result of smaller offerings from Russia and the southern hemisphere, together with unfavorable growing conditions for the new crop in parts of the domestic wheat belt, were the principal strengthening factors. Rye and feed grain were strengthened by the advance in wheat. Flax was firm, under reduced hedging pressure and light offerings of cash seed.

World wheat markets strengthened materially during the week. British markets advanced with the more settled political conditions following the recent election and futures at Liverpool reflected the advance in North Amorican markets. Continental markets were also more active and prices advanced in most deficit areas. Supplies of Durum wheat were light in Italy and the mport quota for foreign Durum wheat was increased from 5 per cent to 25 per cent, according to trade advices.

Following the reception, which will afford an opportunity for alumni and students to get together, there will be a dance in Me-Arthur Court, which will be spedally decorated for the event,


