NOTICE OF FILING APPLICA-TION FOR LICENSE FOR POWER PRIZES

Notice is hereby given that Peter Nystrom, of Niagara, Oregon, has made application to the Hydroelectric Commission of Oregon for a license for development of a water power project for generation of electricity to the extent of 5 horsepower, the water to be appropriated from the waters of the State of Oregon known as Upper Washou Creek and Lower Washou Creek, tributary of the North Fork Santiam River. It is proposed to divert 2 cubic feet per second of such water within the SE 1/4 NE 1/4 Section 28, Township 9 South, Range 4 East, W. M., for operation of a powerplant to be located within the same subdivision.

Said application is made subject to the terms of Chapter 87, Oregon Laws 1931, and is subject to protest or remonstrance on behalf of the public or any district organized for public purposes, or any interested private person or persons on the grounds set forth in said Chapter 87.

All protests and remonstrances should be in writing, in duplicate, and should be filed with the Commission at Salem, Oregon on or before December 1st, 1931.

AND NO ONE WAS KILLED!

This scene of destruction wouldn't exactly create the idea that anyone in the buildings when they were torn sunder by a terrific explosion could have escaped death or serious injury, but we're telling you that they did. And it's a fact. The strewa about wreckage is all that remains of three buildings in Gesswein, N. J., after a blast in one of them rocked the community for miles about in the wee small hours of the morning. A brick building, origin of the explosion, took frame structures on either side to destruction with it.

On November 15, 1874, A. L. Stinson and wife Sarah deeded to the company 40 by 85 feet of land in Jefferson for \$945.50.

February 2, 1874. the company

gave a mortgage to William F. West and wife W. West for \$2000 on 1.45 acres of land, to secure a note for \$577.30.

February 7, '74, the company

mortgaged for a \$5000 loan of J. F. Beckwith on 1.45 acres of land, ground, buildings, etc., including "water wheel, set of carding machines, spinning jacks, picker, twister, windor, reel, two emery cylinders, fine knitting machines, a steam boiler, fittings, pulleys, tools, bobbing spoons, machine needles, steam pipe, rights of way," etc., etc. This is from the records in the abstract office.

Both mortgages were by the

Beaver Hostler Manufacturing company, A. L. Stinson, president and R. H. Watts, secretary, and the acknowledgments were made before Geo. F. Crow, Justice of the peace, and they were recorded by D. H. Murphy, Marion county clerk, by O. J. Carr, deputy.

Stinson, as the old book shows,

took an active part in the management of the business, especially from October, 1873. He became a leading printer in Salem. The plant that became the original Statesman job printing department came from Stinson, down through several successors, including E. M. Wattle, and finally, Len Stinson, son of A. L.

further credit of \$20 for "part of fancy knitter," \$2 for fare from Salem to Jefferson and back, and \$4 for "cleaning and repairing twister." So Mr. Culver got \$2000 worth of his original \$2500 worth of stock for knowing how to install and operate the machinery, and perhaps to run the business.

The old day book shows that

Absalom (spelled Absalom) Smith as treasurer, received \$1000 cash "on note, Ladd & Bush." There were several other entries of borrowed money from Ladd & Bush, and of interest paid on the loans. On June 15, "Absalom" Smith was credited with \$10.50 paid for a "set of books." This old day book was no doubt one of them. Where is the ledger? Can any reader tell the Bits man?

On May 12, 1871, Jacob and

Nancy Conner sold for \$3000 to the Beaver Hostler Manufacturing company 1.45 acres of land, as shown by the records of the Salem Abstract company. This was of course for \$2000 in stock of the company. On May 16 Absalom and Sarah Smith deeded to the company 84-100ths of an acre of land and a quarter of the right of way owned by Conner & Burnett for the ditch from the North Fork of the Santiam. "To the saw mill now constructed." This was of course, also for stock, and later Conner transferred to his wife Nancy \$1250 worth of the stock, according to the old book. Absalom Smith transferred \$500 of his stock to his wife Sarah. Mr. L. Culver transferred to his wife Henrietta C. Culver \$500 worth of stock.
