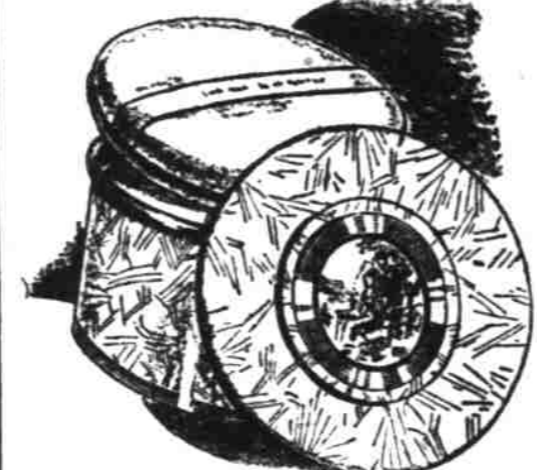

JENKINS TALKS ON CRIME CONFERENCE

Wednesday was police day at the Rotary club with Chief Leon V. Jenkins of Portland as the speaker. The Portland police quartette for singers, and a group of police officers as guests. Chief Jenkins returned recently from a trip to a convention of police chiefs in Paris and his talk dealt with his observations on this trip.

Interesting sketches were his report of a visit to Scotland Yard and to "Old Bailey" criminal court. The judge was Sir Henry Dickens, a son of the novelist, Charles Dickens. Celerity marks the dispatch of justice in English courts and thorough, careful work the detection of crime. A law is law in England, commented the Portlander.

The convention at Paris worked on problems of a universal criminal code and on the extradition of criminals from one country to another. The chief

observation on Paris, particularly its night life, were interesting to Rotarians.

Returning Chief Jenkins attended a police convention in St. Petersburg, Florida, and got there to select Portland as the next convention city.
