

Pulaski Gwinn was married in Salem in 1187 to Nellie McClain, daughter of J. B. McClain, pioneer of 1843. To this union three children were born, one dying in infancy. Nellie Gwinn died in 1892. and later the family moved to Tillamook, where he married Mintha Jones, to which union two children vere born.

In 1897 Gwinn went to Nome in the gold rush to the Klondike, where he spent two years. He followed mining for a number of years, and in later years took up claim around Foster. Old-timers will remember Mr. Gwinn and his brother Jeff when




