

# "Path to Peace" Pointed Out by Dr. Pennington in Club Address

DR. LEVI PENNINGTON, president of Pacific college, Newberg, in an enthusiastically received address before the Salem Woman's club Saturday afternoon told his hearers that there were greater possibilities for peace now than ever before because people are beginning to realize that work must be done at once either toward a war or peace program.

If the program is to be war it means destruction, Dr. Pennington said. The possibilities of present warfare are so powerful that for illustration, with such a force as poison gas dropped from airplanes all the people of the Pacific coast could be destroyed within a very few hours time. Methods of killing have become "efficient, scientific, and wholesale," said Dr. Pennington, and another war could not possibly last four years as the last war did.

Dr. Pennington gave some suggestions which if followed he felt would lead to the "path of peace." These included, good will, unselfishness to the point where our international relations would be altruistic; understanding of other nation's point of view; keep in mind comparative opportunities of nations in evaluating accomplishments; develop a sportsmanlike give and take between nations and people; and organization, such as the League of Nations and World Court, to act as the machinery to carry out the good intentions of the nations.

Special attention was called to the Disarmament conference for which nations have been preparing for the past five years and which will be held this February. Dr. Pennington concluded that "War must be ended in pacific manner, and each can do this by thinking peace."

At the business meeting it was voted that each member wear a recognition badge and thus make it possible for each to know the name of the other and address her by such name in conversation. Friendliness is hoped to be promoted in this manner. Courtesy was extended to Mrs. S. P. Kimball and Mrs. Guy Smith who are ill. Mrs. C. K. Spaulding announced that Mrs. Albert Hunter and Mrs. Harry Weldmer would assist her in the Christmas welfare work.

Mrs. C. C. Clarke asked that a committee be appointed to investigate what could be done in connection with keeping literature off the newstands which would prove harmful to school children. The work was given to the school cooperation committee.

There was an amount of \$10 voted to be used for the needs of the institutions committee in connection with its work. Mrs. Harry Weldmer, Miss Helen Louise Crosby, chairman of the legislative committee, and Mrs. Walter Pennington, spoke urging all women to cast their votes with special reference to the water bond issue.

Mrs. David Wright announced that the women's club booth for Christmas sale would be in Woolworth's store and that volunteers from the club would have charge of the booth until Christmas day.

Mrs. R. R. Hewitt, chairman of the international relations committee had charge of the arrangement of the Saturday afternoon program and introduced Dr. Pennington, and Gladys McIntyre Thomas who sang a group of numbers accompanied by Mrs. Kenneth Rich.
