Built by U. S. Engineers, Factory Will Supply Russian Fords

NIZHNI-NOVGOROD, U. S. S. t., Jan. 2-(AP)-Soviet Russia's newest and largest automobile manufacturing plant, reared in record time by American engineers to turn out Ford cars, officially began operation today aftter the ceremonies with which Russians always greet the opening

of new industrial enterprises. Officials hailed the new factory as the foundation of a motorized era for soviet Russia, in speeches at the plant and in formal reports to Joseph Stalin and government leaders.

Around the factory, which occupies 300,000 square yards and is said to be the largest of its kind in Europe, is being built a new city some 14 miles from the old city of Nizhni-Novgorod, once the great marketplace for middle Asia and China.

Construction and equipment of the plant, named "Molotoff" after Premier Vyacheslaff Molotoff, cost approximately \$119,000,000. The construction, under the direction of the Austin company, of Cleveland, Ohio, was completed November 1, fifteen months after the work started.


