Speech Trials Ended—Final trials were held Wednesday at Willamette university to select the entrants for the Pacific coast extemporaneous and oratorical speaking contests to be held at Pomona college in California March 21, 22 and 23. Hayes Beall, John Rudkin and Ray Lafky won in the preliminary trials for the extemporaneous and one of these will be named today. Gene Smith, Ralph McCullough and Tom Hall were preliminary winners in oratory and the winner in the finals will likewise be named today. Prizes of \$25 and \$15 are offered for first and second places in these two divisions of the Pacific coast contest. Ray Lafky will represent Willamette in the state extemporaneous speaking contest to be held February 12.

Wants More Money—Suit of Robert Parent against the State Industrial Accident commission for added compensation for an injury sustained January 10, 1931, while he was employed at the state tuberculosis farm, was begun yesterday in a complaint filed here in circuit court. Parent claims that he is entitled to 44 months compensation at \$25 a month since he sustained a permanent loss of the use of his left foot and heel. Awards by the commission to him amount to five months and 22 days' payment at \$40 a month and a flat settlement in addition of \$112. Parent seeks the balance in court after arbitration has failed.
