IVAN STEWART IS CLUB'S PRESIDENT

HUBBARD, Jan. 6.—The citizens of Hubbard organized a Community club Monday night choosing Ivan Stewart president; R. C. Painter, vice president, and Margaret McManus, secretary-treasurer. Dr. Gerald Smith of Woodburn gave a talk on widening the Pacific Highway from Salem to Oregon City.

There will be a board of five directors, one to represent the following organizations: the Woman's club, the Pink and Lavender club, school, the Federated Churches, and the Firemen. The shrubs donated by the Women's club, the work the boys have put on the lawn, and the seed given by the school board have helped greatly the appearance of the school grounds. Students and all patrons are asked to refrain from walking on the lawn. About a dozen new books were donated to the grade school library by Mrs. Knight and Mrs. Fields.
