Woodburn News

WOODBURN, Jan. 6.—A request that the city of Woodburn help in fixing up the city park was made at the meeting of the city council Tuesday night when a delegation of members from the local American Legion post, headed by W. H. Baillie appeared. The delegation asked that the city plow and work down the ground on the baseball field. The local post will repair the grounds in many other ways, such as leveling the place, fixing the fence and possibly building a grandstand, if the Legion post will have prior right to the ball park for a period of three years. The park will be used as the home field of the Legion junior baseball team to be put out by the Legion post here again this year.

Baillie, the spokesman for the delegation, pointed out that the national meeting of the American Legion will be held in Portland next year, drawing perhaps 75,000 persons to that city. If Woodburn could have a junior baseball team to represent the city in the state finals to be held during the convention, it would be excellent advertising for the city. Woodburn's team has an excellent chance of being in the state finals this year. The local high school field is not available at all times, because sometimes the activities for the city's adding in fixing up the city ball field was left in the hands of the street commission, made up of Sam Hoeffler, J. H. Livers, Mayor Broyles and street commissioner John Muir.

George Landon and Jasper Largent appeared before the council concerning the connection of a sewer. The proposed sewer will run on Corby street from Mill street to Lincoln street, where it will connect onto a sewer serving another district. Corby street is not a part of that section. A number of residents on the street are agreeable to the proposed plan, while about as large a number cannot afford to have the work done.

Offers for Lots
Councilman Esby reported that he had received offers for several lots owned by the city. The lots are on South Front street. It was reported that several streets and sidewalks are flooded during heavy rains. Street commissioner Muir reported that repairs have been done to all the places mentioned and that the improvements on Fifth and Settlement streets are finished.

Councilman Hoeffler reported that he has made stencils for "No U Turns" signs, and has already prepared several signs. The signs must be put in place in the near future. The district in which "U" turns are prohibited extends from Cleveland street to Lincoln street, where any street intersects with Front.

The council agreed to furnish two men to help the Southern Pacific company clean a city sewer which runs under one of the company's crossings. The railroad company has agreed to pay for any damages.

Deduct on Lights
Since light service was interrupted four times during the month of December, the council decided to deduct 10 per cent from the light company's bill for that month. The bill was for \$49.32.

A bill for \$12.25 was received from the county for gravel and other materials, besides work. Since the gravel was put on a road in the city limits without the sanction of the council, and, apparently through an oversight of the county crew, the governing board decided to pay for all the items on the bill except the gravel.

Asks for Inventory
An inventory of the city's property was asked for by Hoeffler. He was informed that the survey is on file in the recorder's office. E. N. Soule reported that the survey of water mains and connections is shaping up rather slowly because the job of making a map of that nature is very exacting.

Mr. Hoeffler is quite ill at the house of his granddaughter, Mrs. Mayor Broyles stated that he refused to appoint a special night watchman, according to a plan drawn up by local business men, because the entire burden of the watchman's actions would rest upon Broyles' shoulders, although the city has little to do with the actual hiring of the man, and does not pay him.

City treasurer Paul Mills presented a list of property with delinquent assessments. It was decided to send a notice of delinquency to each property owner before taking action upon the matter.

The council was informed that the charity board has received about \$20 of the \$320 allotted to the city for charity work. The money is from the funds donated by employees of the state.
