Court Not Liable—Members of the county court of Baker county would not be liable under the laws for permitting an expenditure by the district attorney of such county in excess of the budget estimate in order to meet an unforeseen but entirely necessary expense, if such allowance is made from the emergency fund, or the money is transferred to meet such needs from another fund by the county court, in accordance with the provisions of the local budget law. This was the substance of an opinion handed down by Attorney General Van Winkle yesterday.

Warning Markers Installed—Red and green reflectorized warning markers yesterday were installed at the four approaches of the intersections of High, Liberty and Commercial streets with Center street. Because of the many automobile collisions at these crossings, making Center a through-traffic street to the intersection bridge has been advocated several times before the city council. It is believed the warning markers may solve the problem without the necessity of effecting the more severe restriction.

CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS FAVORED

Saving to Taxpayers Seen By Prof. Jones; Talk Made to Students

By consolidating small high schools which are close together, thousands of dollars could be saved taxpayers of the state of Oregon, stated Professor W. C. Jones of Willamette university in an address to students. The cost per capita for instruction in high schools of the state ranges from below \$100 to \$410, the larger per capita expenditure almost always being where the enrollment is small.

Numerous instances can be cited where the schools are close together and union districts could be formed at a much lower cost and with improved and more varied instruction. One school with 28 students has a per capita expenditure of \$266 per student while a neighboring high school with an enrollment of 58 students is able to give more complete instruction at a per capita figure of slightly over \$100.

Professor Jones found that in one southern Oregon town one teacher taught all the subjects in the high school while a standardized high school with specialized instructors stood just four miles distant.

Cost High Where Students Are Few
In north central Oregon Dean Hewitt gave commencement speeches to four high schools last spring which were in a 15 mile radius, all small schools. In another section three schools occupy a nine mile radius and have from 15 to over 500 enrollment

with the cost of instruction per student ranging from \$104 to \$270.

In commenting on Professor Jones' speech, Registrar Tennent of Willamette found that the per capita cost of instruction in Salem high is \$104.11 for 1,937 students, according to figures given in the Oregon School Directory, compiled by state superintendent C. A. Howard for 1931-32.

The average cost of instruction for 15,000 pupils in the Portland high schools is \$138.84. Tennent expressed the opinion that community pride was probably one of the most deterrent factors in consolidation of schools into union districts. He stated that the students could be transported by buses at a nominal cost.

Disabled Vets Report Growth In Membership

Salem chapter of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War is experiencing an outstanding growth in the ranks of the state department, it was reported at Wednesday night's meeting at the armory. Although the chapter was given a quota of 35 members, already it has taken in over 50. Nine new members were admitted last night.

As a result of action taken at the meeting, Oregon senators and representatives in congress will be sent a resolution urging that present veterans' relief measures be allowed to remain unchanged and especially that doctors who saw service in the war be retained to handle veterans' disability examinations. Appointed as a committee to draft the resolution were: Arch Mac Donald, chairman; Dr. D. A. Williams and E. L. Clark.

Following the business meeting, the veterans and the auxiliary met together for a social hour and refreshments.
