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Beethoven Concerto to Be Presented

Brahms and Beethoven, with Georges Enesco as the guest artist, will comprise the bulk of the program for the January 11 concert of the Portland Symphony orchestra. The Beethoven concerto has been chosen for the appearance with the orchestra of the famous Roumanian violinist, and Willem van Hoogstraten, conductor of the orchestra, decided that Brahms' third symphony should be given on the same program.

It has been eight years since Enesco has appeared in Portland, and during that time he has definitely emerged from the ranks of "good violinists," and established himself as a master of the instrument. His reputation, already world-wide, is constantly growing, and Portland admirers of violin mastery will await his appearance eagerly.

Enesco has played the violin since the age of five, and at seven was a student at the Vienna conservatory, which ordinarily does not accept any but adult students, or at least youths nearing their majority. But Enesco won awards at the age of 11 both for his playing, and for composition. Before he was twenty, he had an entire program presented at Paris, where he was studying at the time.

The Brahms symphony in F major has been played before in Portland, and in addition portions of the work have been presented at Vienna in December 1883, with Hans Richter conducting, and as a triumph for the composer. London heard the symphony in 1884, while in November of the same year, it was first played in New York.

Seat sale for the concert will open Wednesday, January 7, at the box office at J. K. Gilts, but orders can be made in at any time and will be filled when the sale opens.

As usual, the concert will be at the auditorium, starting at 8:30.
