Armory to be Scene of 2nd City Championship Tilt Tonight

Tonight at the armory Willamette university and Florsheim will meet in the second game of the city championship series between the two. A preliminary game will start at 7:30, Wranglers vs. National Guard.

Willamette won the first game by a small margin, but with Florsheim's recently added strength, they will be favorites to win tonight. Harold Hauk, four year star guard of Willamette university, has joined Florsheim and celebrated his first game with them by coping the high scoring honors which has usually been taken by his old team mate Dwight Adams.

Adams was only one point behind Hauk in scoring and Drager ran a close third to the top pair. Florsheim made a better showing against Oregon State than Willamette did and played much unified ball than the Bearcats.

In spite of the fact that Coach Keene's giants do not look particularly smooth, they put the Rosebuds away handily and showed flashes of good playing. Scales ready for heavy duty now.

George Scales, who did not start in the Rosebud game, is not bothered much now by his infected knee and will be able to start tonight's contest. Roy Benjamin showed up well in the Rosebud game and may get the call at the other forward position. However, Coach Keene stated that he had not definitely chosen the starting five.

Willamette will have one advantage in tonight's game from the fact that more reserve men will be on hand. Florsheim's reserves are strong, but limited in number and should the four foul route claim too many of their players, they would again be forced to play men in the game who would not be legally permitted to play.

"Spec" Keene has been continuing the stiff workouts for his players and two practice sessions were held Thursday. Against Oregon State his men showed that they were in poorer condition than State's men and Keene plans to have his squad in top condition by the time conference games begin.

"Nother big day, or big night rather, coming up for the basketball fans. Willamette and the Florsheim will resume their quarrel—and let's hope they take it more seriously this time—at the armory and the Black Shirts (we'll call 'em that since shirts of various colors are getting into the news these days) of Salem high will meet the Silver Foxes of Silverton high on the high school floor.

Over in eastern and particularly in central Oregon just now skiing and hockey are all the rage, but here in the Willamette valley we stick to golf as an outdoor winter sport. There's been hardly a week that the golfing hasn't been going at the Salem course, despite predictions when the course was laid out that it would be a quagmire every winter.

Of course if a fellow slices into the deep rough in one or two places he may have to sing—"Through the dismal swamp I'm searching for you"—but the fairways are all dry enough for pleasurable golf, and the weather the last few days has been ideal.

What would you rather be than a basketball official? In baseball the umpire has to call balls and strikes, out or safe at the bases; football officiating is nearly as simple and if the official errs, usually nobody but himself and a player or two know it.

But in basketball there are so many things to watch, and the worst of it is that the spectators have a better view of what's going on than the referee, and most of them know a foul when they see it—or think they do, which is just as hard on the official.

Sometimes we see things just as the officials do and sometimes we see just as many fouls on each team, but a different set. And we honestly believe that with the very best of officiating, the worst fouls go unnoticed and the minor ones are called.

Why's that? Simply because the worst fouls, by which we mean those illegal acts which hamper the offense most, occur when a scoring "break" is being made, when action is at top speed, and they consist of almost unnoticeable but damaging "crowding" which prevents shots.

"Crowding" is the only way to keep a tall man from shooting, if he uses an overhead shot, and not all crowding is illegal. If the defensive man is "there first" the man with the ball is to blame for the contact that results. But just a little de movement of a few inches by the defensive man, so imperceptible that even an official who sees it will usually refuse to call it, is a foul if contact results.

Another damaging practice that is seldom called occurs when a player "gets away" with nobody between him and the goal but with one or two men hot on his trail. Usually the moment he slows up for a shot

PAID GRIDDERS NOT FOR W. U.

McKenzie Charges Branded As Ridiculous; Would Avoid Paying Bill

Categorical denial that Willamette university made any agreement to pay Harold McKenzie for playing football on the Willamette team in 1927 was made Thursday night by officers of the university, at the same time that officers of the Sigma Tau fraternity declared McKenzie's unique defense against a suit to collect his fraternity bill was a complete surprise to them.

"The university would never countenance anything of the kind," it was declared by Dean F. M. Erickson, acting head of Willamette in the absence of President Doney who is in the east. The dean added that the charge was preposterous.

Oscar White, who was president of the Sigma Tau fraternity in 1927 when the agreement was alleged to have been made, also denied that the fraternity was party to any agreement whereby it looked to the university for payment of McKenzie's bill rather than to McKenzie himself. Bruce Spaulding, attorney for the fraternity, and a member at the time in question, said the defendant's answer was "all Greek" to him.

Nothing But Jobs Given Says Keene
Coach "Spec" Keene stated that it was his practice in 1927, as it is now, to help students, athletes among them, in obtaining jobs to help support the family in school, and that something of the kind was probably done for McKenzie but certainly nothing more.

E. L. Crawford, McKenzie's attorney, said the defense did not claim a written contract, and refused, on the ground that it might injure his client's chances in court, to divulge the names of witnesses upon whom he would rely to prove a contract existed. He also declined to name the officer or agent of the university who had entered into the alleged agreement with McKenzie.

Crawford said the defense would offer testimony that Mc-

Kenzie received part of the asserted "consideration." The accounting referred to in the fraternity's complaint was made, McKenzie's answer says, for the sole purpose of determining the university's debt to the fraternity.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Harold McKenzie, once a guard on the Willamette university football team, alleged in an instrument filed in circuit court here today he had been hired by Willamette university to play on its team.

McKenzie's charge was contained in an answer to a suit against him in which Sigma Tau, Willamette campus fraternity, sought to collect \$143.79, plus 6 per cent interest from October 31, 1928, allegedly due the fraternity for board and lodging.

McKenzie alleged he contracted with the Sigma Tau university in August, 1927, to play football for the university in return for a passing grade in hygiene, his tuition, \$75 in cash and \$10 a month during the school year. He alleged further the university made arrangements with the fraternity to give McKenzie board and lodging during the school year, the university to pay the fraternity.

The suit against McKenzie was filed here March 16, 1931. It was signed by Lawrence Deacon, manager for Sigma Tau.

An attachment has been filed against McKenzie's automobile pending disposition of the case. McKenzie played football with the Monmouth normal school eleven last fall.

DALLAS, Dec. 7.—Dallas high has two basketball games scheduled for this weekend, both of which will probably be real battles. Friday night Coach Shreeve's boys will go to Molalla to tangle with the squad coached by Don Hartung. Dallas and Molalla play practically the same type of ball and usually put up a good stiff fight.

Dallas will enter this game with a little edge on Molalla on comparative scores, but games in the past have shown that the done on a game means little when these two teams tangle.

Molalla lost to Silverton last week by about a three to one score and Dallas got a lucky break and beat Silverton 14 to 12.

Saturday evening the Dallas team will play a return game with Forest Grove. Dallas won the game at Forest Grove 21 to 15 despite the fact that the Forest Grove outfit was larger and was playing on its own floor.
