

# BEARCAT TEAM CITY CHAMPION

## Beats Florsheim 43 to 33 In Exciting Contest; To Play Tonight

The Willamette Bearcats were crowned city basketball champions unofficially Friday night when they defeated the Florsheims at the army for the second time in the three-game series, 43 to 33. The third game of the series will be played tonight in the Willamette gymnasium at 8 o'clock, with the Willamette freshmen meeting the Wranglers in a preliminary game at 7 o'clock.

Friday night's game was one of alternating in sustained rallies; and Florsheims still have a perfectly good chance to win tonight, for they were handicapped by the early removal of Bab Ashby for "talking back" to the referee. However, three of Willamette's starting players were removed, and it is not clear whether or not they will be replaced by Scates, Benjamin and Allen.

The first quarter was featured by phenomenal guarding on both sides and no field goals were made, Florsheims coming out ahead on free throws, 3 to 2 for the period. However, the Bearcats showed the benefit of much practice in free throw shooting and made nine points out of 10 Florsheim fouls in the game.

The Florsheims "got hot" at the opening of the second period and showed the score up to 23 to 17 after Willamette scored a few points, pushed it up to 13 to 8. About that time George Scates found the range and shooting repeatedly from a corner after the defense was decoyed away, showed the margin up to 21 to 13 at half time.

Each team put on three big spurts in the second half, and Willamette was 10 points ahead a couple of times and at other times had only a few points' margin. Klostrova with his leaping shot was the Bearcats' big gun during this time.

Allen and Rieke continued to do great defensive work and Allen both avoided fouling better than he had been doing before, and took the ball off the backboard a big share of the time.

We have a communication which perhaps was intended for the "safety valve" but we want to answer it, will give it in part here.

"To the Editor:  
I have been a subscriber for your paper for three years and it has been in the home for ten or twelve. It is a fine paper if a person's interests are local when it comes to the sporting world. If a person wants to get all the dope on baseball he must either take some other paper, besides The Statesman or go without.

"I will admit your paper gives you the best news of the sports world in the player as much as the final score or the game itself you have to look elsewhere. The fan wants to know about the player and how he is hitting and the box score is about the best. I would like to find out if you can't attend the game. They can't see them all. Why couldn't you give us the box score? You have the same write up as a leading Portland paper and are affiliated with the Associated Press so surely you must get them. If you would print them it would improve your sport sheet 100 percent when it comes to baseball. Most of the season you have the box score for the Portland Beavers. That is a good start but there are 23 minor and major ball clubs people want to read about."

Now in answering that, we wish to make it clear that we have no occasion to apologize for our sport page, and do not intend to. The Statesman devotes all the space to sport it feels it can afford, and that is more than any other paper in Oregon outside of Portland. It is quite likely some readers with different interests, feel we devote too much space to sport and not enough to types of news they are interested in.

The writer mentions the Portland club's box score which we carried most mornings last season. He of course had no way of knowing it, but The Statesman was the only paper in the state outside of Portland to carry even the box score. We might explain that the Oregon state loop of the Associated Press is a slower speed circuit than the one serving the metropolitan papers, and in view of the demand for a variety of news, has never carried the box scores of the major league games, excepting the world series, and prior to last season, of any Coast league games. It was through special request of The Statesman that the Portland box score was furnished.

Yes, we would like to carry box scores of the major leagues and all of the Coast leagues, but Salem and The Statesman will have to grow to about double their present size, or some new improvement in the transmitting of news and type setting, before that will be possible.

# BATTALINO OUT; IS OVERWEIGHT

## Fails by Nearly 10 Pounds To Make Limit, Title Taken Away Pronto

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The time came today for Christopher "Bat" Battalino to step down from his featherweight throne, and he did it in a large way. Not only did the busy youngster from Hartford, Conn., weigh in almost 10 pounds over the class limit of 126 pounds for a title fight against Lew Feldman tonight, but he forced cancellation of the entire card he was supposed to head in Madison Square Garden.

It had been well known the Hartford Italian, growing fast, was having tremendous difficulty getting down again to the poundage of his class after weighing 135 1/2 pounds for an overweight match in which he knocked out Al Steger, lightweight, in two rounds, and a month ago.

Today Battalino weighed in at 135 1/2, exactly 10 pounds more than Feldman had weighed.

General John J. Phelan, commissioner presiding at the scales, immediately declared Battalino's fight forfeit. Feldman announced he would not fight any man and conceded him that much weight and Jimmy Johnston, Madison Square Garden promoter, scurried around frantically looking for substitutes. He found none, and in a few minutes later called off the entire show.
