## HEALER-EVANGELIST LARCENY DEFENDANT

Larceny of \$400 belonging to an unknown Salem woman, termed Jane Doe Skobvias, was charged against E. Strayer, so-called missionary and healer, when he was halted in a justice court yesterday. He took until Monday at 2 p. m. to enter plea, and meanwhile is in the county jail following failure to raise \$800 bail.

Strayer, according to the data given to Mrs. Skobvias, a widow with five children, that he was holding a health company. His got \$400 of her money on this pretense, and was said to have used \$100 of this to buy two automobiles, and to have banked a share of it.

He allegedly claimed he represented the West coast Sales Service, affiliated with the Great West Endavor Society and the Strayer City Missions.

He told the justice of the peace he and Jane Doe Skobvias were to be married. A petty larceny charge in Seattle brought him a six months sentence Sunday. He has George Strayer, according to records of the state police.

## E. Johnson Will Preach Here Sunday

Bishop Eben S. Johnson of Cape Town, South Africa, will preach at Leslie Memorial church, South Commercial and Myers streets, Sunday morning, on "The Dynamic of Christian Living." Bishop and Mrs. Johnson arrived in Portland Christmas morning, where they visited at the home of a son, Dr. A. Holmes Johnson of that city. Last week they came to Salem to spend some time with another son, Rev. S. Darlow Johnson.

Bishop Johnson has been in charge of the work of the Methodist Episcopal church in the southern half of Africa for the past 16 years. He talks interestingly of Africa's wild animal life, and describes in fascinating manner her dense jungles, her wonderful rivers, and her wild plains covered with tropical vegetation. He has traveled through strange and wild territory. Sometimes he can use an automobile, but often only the donkey, the bicycle or the foot traveler could penetrate the wilds through which he passes. There are in Salem many who knew Bishop Johnson during the years of his ministry in Iowa, some of them members of churches which he served.
