Pupils to be Examined—Pupils at Park school will be given physical examinations today and at Englewood, tomorrow and Thursday, by Dr. C. C. A dental corrective clinic will be held tomorrow and the regular toxoid and vaccination clinic from 8:30 to 10:00 o'clock on Saturday morning, both at the health center.

CITY POLITICS IS COMING TO FRONT

As the May primary election approaches from afar rumors begin to float about concerning the city government and officials. One rumor is that H. S. Bosward, state printer until deposed by Governor Julius L. Meier, will be a candidate for the office of city recorder, purchasing agent and municipal judge. It is understood that Mark Poulsen, veteran incumbent, again will seek the position.

Rumor also has it that in either the May or November election an initiative measure providing for civil service for the Salem fire and police departments may be placed on the ballot. Another measure being talked is one for giving the city a managerial form of government, retaining the mayor and 14 aldermen but giving the city manager important appointive powers.

One argument given against the city manager system is that a new city charter would have to be obtained and in this event the clause exempting the city of Salem from paying a general road tax, provided in the present charter, probably would be revoked. Salem is one of four cities in the state that are not required to pay this levy.

GRAND JURORS TO GET STRAYER CASE

Three Names Brought Into Tangle Over Alleged Fraudulent Acts

Case of Elmo Strayer, accused of larceny, was handed to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace Miller Hayden yesterday after it had occupied a full afternoon in justice court trial and Strayer's bail was set at \$1000.

Strayer first broke into court here as E. Strayer, when state officers arrested him on a traffic charge and then found evidence of fraud and misrepresentation about the West States Sales Service company to extent that he secured \$400 from a woman, known before yesterday as Jane Doe Skobovias. She appeared on the witness stand yesterday as Zelma Skubovius, and after nearly three hours on the witness stand, comparative little testimony was secured from her.

Reuben Skubovius, son of the woman from whom the money was alleged to have been taken by fraud, testified that Strayer was known to him first as Mr. Orest and that later letters received by Strayer indicated that he was known as J. D. Matthews also.

Strayer or Geer posed to Reuben and four of his boy's friends that he was a chemist and attracted to get them to sell extracts, known as Foster G. F. products but in some unknown way connected with the West States Sales Service too. Strayer is known here also as a missionary and healer.

The trial yesterday brought into light blank checks signed by J. D. Matthews and bound in the hat band of defendant, which prosecution claimed to be forgeries. Strayer intimated he could put Matthews on the stand, but no attempt was made to do so.

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PRIVATE INDUSTRY HELP SAID NEEDED

State and Counties Unable To Provide Relief for All of Idle men

Private industry will have to come to the fore before unemployment conditions are solved satisfactorily in Oregon, J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, reported to Governor Meier Monday. Devers also is special investigator of unemployment conditions for the governor.

Devers' report showed that 10,164 men are now receiving part-time employment in state highway emergency relief operations, for which they receive an average of \$18 each per week. The men are employed on a rotation basis, with the result that the maximum number of workers employed during any week is 2541. Expenditures to date have aggregated \$449,438.55, the report showed.

Devers pointed out that while his previous report showed that the number of men registered as unemployed was approximately 17,725, the number of unemployed in all counties outside of Portland has now increased to 21,000. Of the 21,000 men registered for employment, 12,000 were said to be in dire need.

Of the total number of men employed in the emergency program 573 are in Multnomah county. Multnomah county is second with 121 men, Wasco third with 107 men, and Union fourth with 95 men. Only 20 men are now employed daily in Linn county, the report indicated.

"In most of the counties," Devers' report read, "the selection and designation of secondary highways has been made and plans and specifications are now being worked out for the improvement and maintenance of such secondary highways. Under the law creating secondary state highways the state highway commission is authorized to expend on such highways at least \$1,250,000 during 1932."

Secondary Highway Work is Started
In some counties work on

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these secondary highways already is underway, and it is the purpose of the commission to promote work on these highways in all the counties for the purpose of contributing to the relief of the unemployed.

"However, until motor vehicle license fees are paid for the year 1932 it will be necessary for the commission to make some arrangement whereby funds will be available for this secondary state highway work. The commission is now giving serious thought to ways and means by which such funds may be provided.

"For some time due to the depression private industries in most of the counties have either shut down entirely or have so curtailed their operations that the communities which heretofore have relied so greatly upon these industries for employment are struggling under a very distressing situation. There also has been an insistent demand for tax reduction, which has caused the counties to reduce their levies, and make it impossible to provide any substantial relief for the unemployed. It seems imperative, therefore, that in each county private industries be called upon to renew operations, in some degree at least, at an earlier date than they now contemplate."

APPORTIONMENT IS MADE, ROAD AREAS

Three Mills Available for Districts Including Carryover Fund

Road district apportionment of \$101,410 to which is added unexpended balances of \$24,246 carried over from 1931 was made by County Clerk U. G. Boyer to the 61 districts in the county. The distribution for this year is three mills compared to 4.4 mills the previous year. Included in the apportionment is \$1564 which goes to Stayton whose roads are handled as county highways and another deduction of \$4925 taken out of the total apportionment to cover administrative costs.
