NEW SCHOOL OF MOTHERING



Many young mothers, on hearing of the new school in New York for the purpose of giving high school girls instruction in the art of mothering babies, will sigh dolefully and wish that something of the kind had been introduced in their school days. Most of our young women graduated from colleges and universities are equipped with every kind of knowledge relative to art, science and business, but the vital business of motherhood remains a profound mystery to them. The Dalton School has included in its curriculum an extensive course on infant care and upbringing. Real babies are used in the classroom to give the girls practical experience. The infants have been chosen, children of mothers who are forced to work for a living. They receive the best care known to science and will be developed into perfect specimens of young men and women. The course includes everything that a mother should know to bring up a baby in the way it should be: dieting, bathing and clothing, as well as the procedure in treating the baby during the usual trying periods of teething, colic and other things that the budding citizen must experience. The innovation is a welcome one to the students. It breaks the monotony of mathematics and other kindred headaches and at some future date will prove a boon to the potential mother—not to mention the father, who otherwise would be forced to make a nocturnal perambulation.
