Few Certificates Sell—Few delinquent tax certificates are being sold to investors this year, the collector's office at the courthouse reports. In former years \$20,000 to \$40,000 in certificates were sold annually but reduction of the interest from 12 to 8 per cent has made investors less anxious to make such purchases. Taxes become delinquent two months after the final date for payment comes and certificates may be issued six months after this time is reached.

Salesmen Call—Several textbook salesmen left samples yesterday at the office of the county school superintendent. All schools in the county have adopted some free textbooks, while some have made all textbooks in the grade districts free. The total amount the district was required to raise for free texts the first year was \$1.50 for each pupil. ARTIFICIAL FLOWER MAKING IS POPULAR

The art of making artificial flowers that look naturally real is attracting a considerable number of Salem women to the special classes being held by Mrs. F. Rosenquest, local woman, at Miller's store. There is no charge for the lessons, which will continue another week.

The flowers are made from wood fibre, and the brilliant and pastel shadings are carried out as in the genuine bloom.

Incidentally, into one small corsage or boutonniere is worked the contributions of many countries, from Japan comes the wood fibre itself, which is used for petals; from Germany the green leaves; from Czechoslovakia the tiny green cup which sets the petals; rubber stems are made in France, and a special glue used in the flowers comes from Chile.

Irrigation Talk Series on Radio Start Jan. 27

So much interest has been developed in private irrigation systems in Oregon recently that considerable demand has developed for information on methods of considering water. Mr. R. Lewis, irrigation engineer at the Oregon State college experiment station, has started a series of radio addresses on this subject which may be heard two Wednesday nights per month over the college station, KX.

Schedule of subjects is, January 27, "The Border Method"; February 10, "The Furrow or Corrugation Method"; February 24, "The World Flooding Method"; March 9, "Use of Portable Pipe"; March 23, "Sprinkler Irrigation"; and April 6, "Sub-Irrigation Methods." Mr. Lewis says the best method to adopt depends on many local factors.

Tusko Struts His Stuff At Stayton P. T. A. Meet; Large Crowd at Program

STAYTON, Jan. 19.—Attendance at the P. T. A. meeting Monday night was the largest of any during the present school year, probably due to the box social scheduled and the rumor that "Tusko" was to be there.

H. J. Rowe, president, presided during the business session. It was brought out that a place was found for almost every article of food and clothing which had been donated by the grade school pupils at Christmas time. Any surplus stuff was placed in the vacant room next to the bakery and since Christmas many calls have come to Mr. Rowe, so that the articles left over are now but few.

Mrs. Freda Roberts, treasurer, reported better than \$70 in the treasury, also that the organization had Monday night 73 paid up members.

The meeting was then turned over to the program committee, R. G. Wood, Mrs. Frank Stupka, Mrs. H. E. Tobie and Floyd Crabtree, who had been selected from the losing side in the membership drive. The first number was a vocal solo by Miss Margaret Ireland, accompanied by Mrs. H. A. Beauchamp.

Next R. G. Wood, himself a "magician" whose appearance any program is always warmly received, announced that Clarke Wood, of Salem, also a magician would present two acts, the first to be a Chinese. Mr. Wood's tricks were heartily applauded.

Then came the imitable "Tusko". He was announced by Prof. Tobie, and after considerable clanking of chains, walked right through the wall of the stage, with his "ring-mistress" Mrs. F. Stupka. After dancing, answering questions and doing other tricks, Tusko suddenly collapsed. It was necessary for Mrs. Tobie to forward with a suspicious looking gallon bottle, which she hastily emptied in a nearby tub, before the huge beast was able to go on with the act. After drinking his fill the big boy gamboled about the stage in glee, in the glory of his purple and gold robe. Finally he drove the "ring-mistress" from the stage, ending the act.

Since two of the committee were seated on the stage one is only justified in believing that the other two members had much to do with Tusko's legs and "imms". It was certainly a clever act, creating much merriment.

Then came the sale of baskets; there was a range in variety, more elaborate, others simple. Each lady bringing a man was given a door prize, and many of the little grade school girls were there stepping out for the first

time with the boy friend.

The little girls brought baskets, which were sold only to the boys at the stated price of 25 cents. All the baskets were auctioned off by George Keech, and netted the sum of \$11.41, which will be applied to the sum already set aside for strings. The ladies' basket brought from 75 cents to \$2.25 each.

While Stayton runs five school buses, and a large percentage of the grade school pupils, who will get the benefit of the new play equipment live in town, it was noted that it was only the townpeople who brought baskets or bought them and who made up the large crowd, and many of them do not even have children in school.

Approximately \$23,000 contributed during December by state officials and employees, based on one day's pay each month, has been distributed throughout the state to relieve the unemployment situation, it was announced Tuesday by the governor's committee on unemployment relief.

A total of \$16,000 was distributed among the various county relief committees. The remainder represents contributions made in various localities directly by the state official or employee.

General Thomas Rilea, chairman of the governor's committee, announced that there had been an upward trend in the number of persons requiring relief.

In letters sent to the county committees, Rilea urged that where direct relief was needed, that such relief be confined exclusively to the actual necessities of life. The county allocations ranged from \$150 to \$1000.

The state contributions will continue for three months.

Gasoline and Oil Blasts Cause 7 Deaths in 1931

There were seven deaths due to careless handling of gasoline and kerosene in Oregon in 1931, according to a report prepared Tuesday by Lester Davis, deputy state fire marshal.

Five of these deaths occurred in homes. Forty-four persons were severely burned or otherwise injured by gasoline and kerosene explosions in 1930 a total of 12, or nearly one-half of the 32 deaths by fire in Oregon, were caused by gasoline and other petroleum products. Eleven of these deaths occurred in homes.

Property damage resulting from fires caused by gasoline and gas line explosions in 1931 aggregated \$234,000, the report showed.

DECEMBER TRAFFIC DEATH TOLL IS 13

Thirteen persons were killed and 578 persons were injured in 2574 traffic accidents in Oregon in December, according to a report prepared Tuesday by Charles Pray, superintendent of state police.

In 588 accidents the persons involved failed to give right-of-way. Approximately 230 of the accidents were due to speeding while in 165 cases the drivers failed to give proper signals. A total of 109 drivers failed to observe stop signs.

The state police engaged in 17,263 traffic activities. A total of 8132 warnings were issued. There were 181 arrests, with fines aggregating \$2461.40. Fees were collected in the amount of \$4614.

General law enforcement resulted in 418 arrests, with 26 acquittals. The fines aggregated \$16,988, while the jail sentences totaled 32 years. A total of 155 cases are pending in the courts.

A total of 247 complaints were investigated, 57 of which were classified as cleared.

STAYTON, Jan. 19.—Judge Rossman of the Oregon supreme court will be the speaker at the father and son banquet Wednesday night at the Forester hall, instead of Dr. Dubach, of O. S. C., as had been previously announced. The banquet is scheduled for 6:30.
