kas of Willamette university. An unusually large audience was present for this talk which brought the country to the south into very close and interesting proximity. Dr. Vazakas told his listeners

that Mexico was one country which knew how to be poor gracefully. He pointed out the two cultures which form the background of these interesting people whom he assured his audience were fast developing a culture second to none in music, literature and mechanical arts.

One culture is that of the Mayan Aztecs and the second is that of the colonial or Portuguese and Spanish and the present race is a definite mixture of these peoples, thus they are a heterogeneous people and this in contrast to the people of the United States who

are truly homogeneous. The city of Mexico has many brilliant and valuable colonial monuments and could well be called a "city of churches" Dr. Vazakas told his listeners. The people there are very hospitable, have no conception of time and are picturesque.


