PORTLAND, Jan. 26—(AP)—Continued lack of price change in the cube market on the Portland produce exchange, reflects the steadiness of the butter trade generally.

There is no change of interest in the egg market situation for the day. Prices are stationary and there is sufficient supply, or more for all needs.

While there has been a slight easing in the market for hogs recently, country killed meats in general have held remarkably well in view of the livestock situation.

Latest trade in spot delivery onions is still confined to the \$3.50 mark with sacks and twine furnished by buyers.

CREAMERY SHOWS PROFITABLE YEAR

Mt. Angel Institutions has Biggest Business Ever In Its History

Annual report of the Mt. Angel Cooperative Creamery is being made out this week to stockholders, and shows current assets of \$55,855.62, and current liabilities of \$32,124.73.

Sales and income during the year ending December 31 totaled \$478,411.94.

The cooperative last year reached the highest volume of business handled since organization in 1915 with the year showing an increase of nearly \$38,000 over 1930.

The creamery has manufactured 9,309,330 pounds of butter in its 14 years of work.

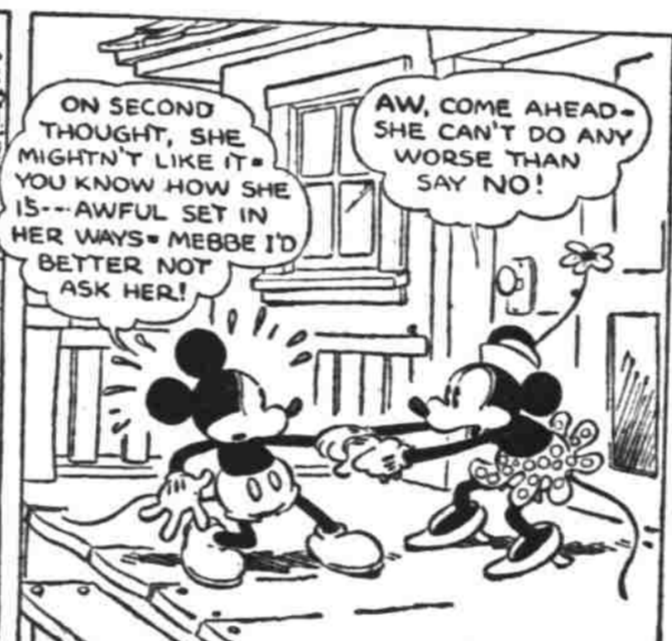

Swan Erikson Gets Piece of Steel in Eye; Removed Now

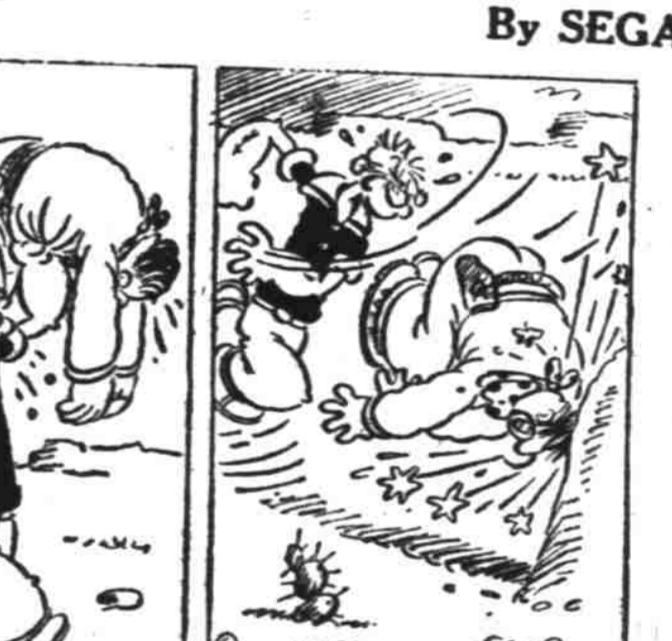
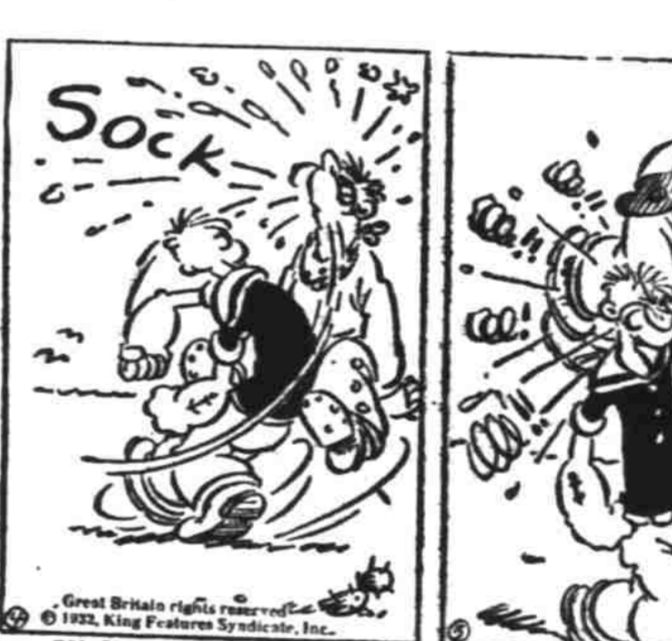
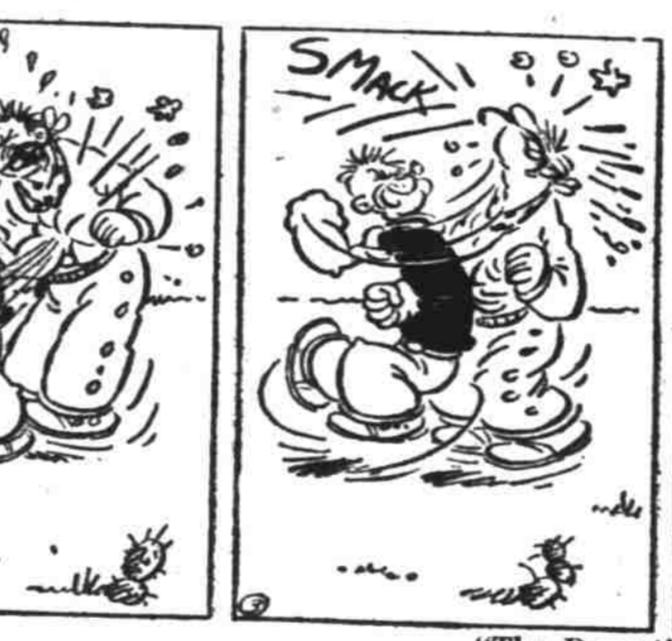
