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SNOWBOUND SCHOOL LATE WITH REPORT

Miss Frances Friend wants to get her regular monthly school report in on time to Mrs. Mary Fulkerson, school superintendent, but Old Man Winter is against her.

"I am very sorry this month's report will reach you late but we have been snowed in for a week and unable to get to Silverton with our mail. We have 34 inches of snow," writes Miss Friend in a letter received here yesterday.

She teaches at the Bridge Creek school, district 133, 13 miles east of Silverton. The school is reached by going on the Silver Creek Falls road as far as Drake's corner and then going east into the ridge country. Miss Friend opened the school in November after no instruction had been available there in two years because there were no pupils. Incoming families have a total of seven children who are now receiving instruction.

Deep snow above Silver Creek falls has caused the Silver Creek Falls Timber company to abandon logging operations there, it was reported yesterday. Snow was said to be from 36 to 40 inches deep. In transferring the loggers to districts without snow, many of the men were compelled to walk 12 miles.

HORNER TALKS OF HISTORY ON RADIO

Those interested in Oregon history may turn their radios on Friday evening to KOAC at 8:15 and listen to Prof. J. B. Horner in his talks on the "Oregon Our Fathers Knew." The series is attracting attention over the state. The following is the digest of his broadcast of last evening:

"Oregon pioneers have lived in two worlds, so different that men who prospered in the one world have failed in the other."

"One was the world of the slow ox-team in which sturdy founders of the simple life built slowly and permanently; the other is the rushing world of invention in which men ride about on chariots of fire, travel in the depths of the sea like monsters, fly in the air like eagles, grasp the thunderbolt and draw it into a fine thread, and fastening it in a glass bulb illuminate the home and the city with a silent light incandescent."

"In the former world men had visions of a new land which they were gradually opening to civilization, in the latter world humanity is rushing at a marvelous speed—living as much in ten years as their ancestry lived in fifty."

Governor Meier telegraphed the executive department early Friday that he had arrived in Chicago, and was to leave there at 1 p. m. on the last lap of his trip to Washington. The governor said the weather was fair in Chicago, and that all members of his party were in excellent health.

Governor Meier is due to reach Washington at 8 a. m. today. He was accompanied by Mrs. Meier, Henry Hansen, state budget director, and Colonel A. E. Clark, Portland attorney.

Hansen, the governor's telegram read, has changed to a green shirt, which is the prevailing style in Washington.

VAZAKAS TALKS OF MEXICO'S OUTLOOK

At the Salem Ad club Friday noon, Alexander Vazakas, professor of languages at Willamette university, told the club of some of his observations during a trip into Mexico last summer. He says that the observant traveler in Mexico has a feeling that something is going to happen in that country. He said this feeling corresponded with the feeling of impending important events which he realized while spending some time in the Balkans during the war. He feels however that the situation in Mexico will lead to even greater happenings.

An entirely new race in Mexico is the result of the fusion of the Aztec and Spaniard. They are hospitable and friendly and are rapidly coming to the front with their studies in art, literature, paintings and other works.

The professor spoke highly of the Jesuits and the manner in which they instruct the youth of Mexico. He declared they were the best teachers in the world.
