Cadman, World Famous as Music Composer, Will Direct Operetta

To hear Charles Wakefield Cadman interpret his own piano music, accompany singers, and appear as guest conductor of his own operetta "The Golden Trail" when it is presented by the Willamette university combined glee club and orchestra will be the rare privilege of music lovers of Salem. The production is scheduled to take place at 8 o'clock, Friday night, February 5, at the Grand theatre.

In addition to the operetta, Willamette university is presenting Mr. Cadman in a recital of his own music Saturday night at Walter hall on the university campus. Tickets for both the operetta and the recital are to be on sale at the Central Pharmacy on State street all this week following Monday noon. All seats will be reserved.

A cast of sixteen principals and a chorus of sixty trained voices will be assisted by an eighteen piece orchestra. The production staff is headed by the music director, Professor Cameron Marshall, head of the Music department of the university. He is immediately assisted by William Jones and Herbert E. Rahe, members of the Willamette university faculty who are injecting enthusiasm and dramatic ability into the cast.

Ronald Craven and Elizabeth Clement head the cast carrying the love interest while Ronald Hewitt and Maurice Dean supply the comic relief. Mr. Hewitt plays six different parts in his capacity as jack-of-all-trades at the Golden Trail hotel where the action of all three acts of the operetta is supposed to take place. The historical setting is during the gold rush in 1849 in northern California.

Several different choruses take part in the production in the roles of miners, Indians, emigrants, Spanish seniors and senioritas, Mexican belles, and other picturesque people.

PRUDENTIAL HEADS PROBE IS SOUGHT

Mott Criticizes Officers; Department Operating Firms as Solvent

Grand jury investigation in Multnomah county to determine whether any criminal responsibility exists on the part of Carl Johnston, president, and C. A. Degraze, vice president, of the Prudential group of savings and loan associations, has been requested by James Mott, state corporation commissioner, it was announced Saturday.

Barnett H. Goldstein, special prosecutor for the state corporation commission, was directed by Mott to arrange and present the evidence to the grand jury. Mott said he had asked Governor Meier to direct the attorney general to appoint Goldstein a deputy attorney general. He said such procedure would expedite the cases in event indictments were returned.

"Our investigation shows," Mott announced, "that approximately \$80,000 of the funds belonging to the Prudential, Union and Federal Union Savings and Loan associations were diverted by Johnston and Degraze, and that they used the Prudential Bancorporation, holding company of the loan association, as a vehicle for the operation of a financial racket."

Mott's written statement continued: "In this connection I desire to emphasize the fact that the Prudential group of savings and loan associations are not being liquidated. They were impaired by grossly extravagant and, as our investigation has disclosed, by questionable management. The associations are solvent and are being operated as solvent institutions by the department."

"Figures show that we are operating these institutions at an expense of approximately 25 per cent of the cost of operations under the management of Johnston and Degraze. We hope by this kind of operation to restore the entire impairment within the next few months so that no depositor will lose a dollar of his investment."

"The fact that \$80,000 of the funds of a building and loan association can be illegally sequestered and loaned out in spite of such impairment, the association can be restored and saved by responsible and economic management is, in my opinion, a striking testimonial of the fundamental soundness of building and loan structure."

Under the Occurrences and Gossip at the center of Oregon's state government

THE governor of Oregon arrived at Washington, D. C., yesterday morning after an uneventful trip, his telegram to the executive offices here today stated. He added that he and his party, including Colonel A. E. Clark, were met by Senator McNary and General Charles U. Martin.

It seems that Senator Steiwer, whose term expires this year, was not among the welcome party. That isn't so strange when it appears that Colonel Clark is being groomed for a candidate against Steiwer in this year's campaign. Dispatches last night indicate Meier has given out several interviews at the national capital.

The Meier party will appear before the United States army engineers on Monday or Tuesday of this week. As has already been reported, their thumbs are already half way down on the Columbia river project, but the attention to this power project is being attracted considerably by the governor's personal visit.

The big meeting of the coming week will be the highway session in Portland Thursday. William Hanley, who was here yesterday, said the session would be an important one, and in addition to a lot of legislation he has heard there will be important business, including perhaps the 30 per cent cut in administration.

While the highway session is going on in Portland, the Empire Holding corporation case will be resumed at Salem under Judge Gale S. Hill, who was assigned to that case by Chief Justice Henry J. Bean. It is expected the defendants will argue demurrers filed when they were arraigned here about 10 days ago.

The press onslaught on the Charles Thomas home Friday night was very much of a success, even the host appeared to enjoy himself, and "Under the Dome" must agree with another columnist in Salem that "Mrs. Charley is some cook." That house-warming was well worth waiting for.

The organization making attacks on state officials is on the increase, and in addition to press members, those who have entertained are drafted as members. So the next dinner will include one more, and so on. The group at the Thomas home discussed the next victim, but so far no decision has been reached.

WASHINGTON WILL BE HONORED HERE

Wallace McCamant to Talk At Banquet Planned in Salem February 17

The beginning of the bicentennial celebration of the birth of George Washington will occur in this vicinity on the evening of Wednesday, February 17, 1932. The First Methodist church, of which Dr. B. Earle Parker is minister, will be the host, and John H. Carlin, a member of the state tax commission, is president of the brotherhood of the church, has appointed his sub-chairman, and extensive plans are being formulated for a genuine celebration.
