

OREGON EGG TRADE CONTINUING STEADY

Storage Input is About to Start, Sellers not so Anxious to Unload

PORTLAND, Jan. 30—(AP)—While there appeared a generally steady tone in the local egg trade for the week end, quotations were unchanged as a rule. The steadiness here appeared in direct contrast to the extreme weakness again reflected in the California as well as eastern trade although this showing is somewhat relieved by the fact that Portland already at an extreme low mark.

That the starting of the storage egg input season is about to materialize in the Pacific northwest is indicated by the lack of competition among former keen sellers.

Another change appears in the situation. Producers are no longer peddling the stock from store to store so generally as a week ago; indicating that they at last realize the seriousness of this.

Butter Unchanged
There was no open market change in the price of butter locally for the day. On the Produce Exchange the cube market was also stationary. No change in the price of butterfat.

Market for live chickens continues to reflect a very slow trading tone here with little change in the list. Here and there offers of 90 for light weight hens are heard but there appears no snap in the buying.

There is good demand locally for dressed hen turkeys but the call for toms is rather slow with a shade of weakness reflected. Sales of hens are quickly made.

There was a rather auto shortage of hothouse rhubarb in the local trade for the weekend as a result of the almost general failure of arrivals from the summer section. Local offerings were far below requirements.

"Roller" potatoes from Yakima are clogging the place east with resulting weakness in the general situation.

41 EWES PRODUCE 59 LAMBS, REPORT

STATION, Jan. 30—In spite of the bad weather, sheep in this section are said, so far, to be in good condition. However, since it is the lambing season it is quite essential that owners, or herdsmen, be with them day and night. Chas. D. Station, who has a band of sheep on the place east of town said that so far 41 ewes had produced 59 lambs. Last year an average of seven out of the ewes in his flock had twins. He hardly expects them to do as well this year. Thursday night he said that since Monday, 4 lambs had been born. It is most important that the sheep be housed up now, with the weather what it is.

GIESY AND SCHWAB PLEAD NOT GUILTY

B. F. Giesy and Zeno Schwab, both officers in the now defunct Willamette Valley Mortgage Loan company at Aurora, pleaded not guilty Saturday in circuit court here to grand jury indictments charging them with obtaining money under false pretenses. The case will be set for trial at an early date before Judge L. H. McMahon.

In one indictment the men are held to have signed a fraudulent promissory note for \$3200, using the name of Alice Martinson.

In another indictment the Aurora men are held to have sold a note for \$1000 to Edward N. Diller, claiming the note was secured by real property in Linn county when there was no such security behind the note.

Hanley Denies Any Intention To Resign Job

Reports that William Hanley of Burns was to resign as a member of the state highway commission, were denied by Commissioner Hanley here Saturday. "The reports are false," Hanley said.

Hanley declared that he was enjoying his work as a member of the commission, and had no idea of retiring.

WEEK SHOWS LIVESTOCK SLUMP PROFIT TAKING LOWERS GRAINS

Hogs and Cattle Down But Lambs Steady; Wheat up Cent

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30—(AP)—A falling off in hog and cattle prices, and lower quotations on eggs accounted for the major activity on the general market here this week.

Hog prices were down generally 25 cents. Heavy, 250-300 lbs., were 3.75-4.50; mediums, 200-220 lbs., were 4.00-5.00, and lights, 160-180 were quoted at 4.85-5.00. Feeders and stockers which have held firm for several weeks, continued steady and unchanged. The supply of hogs was scant.

A lot of from 15 to 25c was experienced in the cattle list. Good steers were around 5.35-5.75, and cows were quoted at 4.00-4.50, only off fractional. Choice vealers were off about 25c to 7.50-8.00.

There was no change in the lamb list with choice animals at 4.50-5.00, medium at 3.50-4.50, and common grade at 2.50-3.50. Eggs were down to 16c for fresh extras. Standards were 15 and mediums 14 cents.

Butter prices were generally unchanged at 23 for extras, 22 for standards and prime firsts, and 21c for firsts.

Wheat improved a cent to 76c for big Bend, and 61c for other grades. White oats was 24.50 and gray oats, 25.00.

The hay list was unchanged at these buying prices, f. o. b. Portland: Alfalfa 14-15; clover and vetch 12.50-13. Straw was 6.50-7.00 a ton.

Hop prices narrowed a bit to 11 and 12 1/2c for 1931 Oregon crop.

Wool was unchanged at 12c for valley coarse and 13c for medium. There was no change in Italian prunes at 4 and 6 cents a pound.
