proposal warmly as it offered a material basis of hope for getting Japanese soldiers off Chinese soil. Even more impressive was the declaration with which the British cabinet minister began his remarks. He said:

"His majesty's government feels it impossible that the present position in the far east should be allowed to continue. . . . Shanghai is the scene of a series of conflicts in which rifles, machine guns, artillery and airplanes are taking part. War in everything but name is in progress."

Informed persons asserted that the negotiations for the concerted move had been in progress in Washington for several days, with the British ambassador acting for his government.

Andre Tardieu, French minister of war, and Foreign Minister Dino Grandi of Italy, briefly announced their governments had sent instructions about the peace proposals to their representatives at Tokyo and Nanking with a view of taking the steps indicated by Mr. Thomas.

Delegates laugh at Sato's Declaration

M. Sato said he was glad to hear the important statements made by the British and other representatives.

"I am particularly glad," he continued, "because it was we ourselves, the Japanese government, who asked the representatives of Great Britain, the United States and France at Tokyo to take concerted action such as was required at Shanghai."

"In view of the very serious situation that exists in Shanghai, my government asked the representatives of those three governments to take any necessary measures at once."

"My government put forward that request without any hesitation. We felt that this was a time which called for exceptional measures."

At the Japanese delegate's remarks there were audible gasps and laughter.

FIVE PLANES ARE STORM'S VICTIMS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Lashing the skies in its frigid fury the far west's most recent storm had torn five airplanes from their courses today, killing one pilot, sparing four and leaving the fate of nine others persons in doubt.

While a vast fleet of approximately 150 planes, many of them provided by the army, searched the world Tehachapi region of Southern California for a Century-Pacific passenger plane that disappeared into the clouds last Friday with five men and three women, the charred body of Pilot John W. Sharpnack was found at Rio Vista, Cal.

Sharpnack's body and his plane were found by William Campbell, another air mail pilot, whose plane cracked up without injury to him when he landed at Rio Vista.

Pilots George T. Douglas and Ed Greer, flying from Boise, Idaho to Salt Lake City, Utah, were missing from late last night until their plane was found this afternoon by another United Air lines mail pilot, Jack O'Brien. The plane was undamaged and it was assumed the men were safe and enroute to Salt Lake City.

MAINTENANCE COST FOR HIGHWAYS CUT

PORTLAND, Feb. 2.—(AP)—General maintenance costs on state highways showed a marked decline in 1931 from those of 1930, J. C. Ainsworth, chairman of the state highway commission, said today.

His statement was based on "preliminary tabulations on costs" which have just been completed. Maintenance costs, Ainsworth said, dropped from \$2,117,282.85 in 1930 to \$1,903,647.27 for 1931, a reduction of \$213,635.58. This despite the fact the state maintained 203 miles more of road last year than in 1930.

"The average cost of maintenance per mile has been reduced \$97.70 during the past year," Ainsworth said. "Where it was \$576 in 1930 it was but \$478.90 in 1931."

CITIZENS OF U. S. EVACUATE NANKING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The navy was advised tonight that 26 Americans would evacuate Nanking.

A message from the American destroyer Simpson at Nanking timed at 7:40 a. m. (Eastern Standard time) today said 14 of the Americans were on board the Simpson and the remainder were on shore "in a safe and accessible place."

They were to leave the city, which was reported quiet, on a merchant vessel Wednesday morning (Nanking time). Lieutenant Commander P. W. Rutledge, in charge of the Simpson, said there had been no resumption of firing.

DAIRY COOPERATIVE TOTAL \$2,500,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Members of the Dairy Cooperative association were told at their annual meeting here today their combined annual business is about \$2,500,000.

The estimate, announced by William W. Henry, secretary and manager, was based on figures kept since last August 6. The total value of dairy products sold by the association during the five-month period covered by his records was \$970,457.48, he said.

"We will have an increase in dairy products which will make lower butter prices than you have seen in years," he said.

The association confirmed the election of directors for the various districts. Those elected this year to serve for two years were J. M. Nichols, Salem; E. A. Newby, Washougal; and Arthur P. Ireland, Forest Grove.

ALBERT FALL NOT TO GET FREEDOM

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Albert B. Fall today lost his last hope of freedom before the end of his sentence for accepting a \$100,000 bribe from E. L. Doheny.

The federal parole board of two men and a woman declined to shorten the imprisonment of the former secretary of interior, with an assertion that such action would be "unjustifiable and incompatible with the welfare of society."

Chairman Arthur D. Wood of the board, and Irvin B. Tucker and Dr. Amy N. Stannard announced their decision in a statement issued by the department of justice. The board remarked:

"Whether or not others equally guilty have not been punished is beside the issue entirely."
